Start Time and End Time: List when each party started and ended

Party-hours and miles: This is very important because much research is based on these statistics. A Party is any group of people birding together, or even one person birding alone. If the same group is together all morning, eats lunch, then stays together all afternoon, that's one party. But if the same people are together all morning, then after lunch they split up into 2 groups, they become two new parties. That group had a total of 3 parties that day (one in the morning and two in the afternoon). It does NOT matter how many people are in each party. All of the CBC statistics are based on "parties", not "people". Base the decision of "how many parties on the makeup of each group. When people shift around, it becomes a different party.
