Accessible, Inclusive Birding Gail Richards, President

Sea and Sage is continuing our efforts to expand our outreach to our entire community and to be more inclusive. To this end, we have joined other Audubon chapters in supporting Birdability, a new non-profit organization dedicated to assuring that birding is for everybody, including those with disabilities.

Birdability was born out of a vision from Virginia Rose, who uses a wheelchair for mobility due to a childhood horseback-riding accident. Virginia has a passion for birding, and through her local chapter, Travis Audubon Society in Austin, Texas, she started exploring local trails and recording details about their accessible features. Her vision expanded significantly when National Audubon agreed to establish and provide start-up support for a website and map of the U.S. that allows birding sites to be identified and surveyed for features important to those with physical challenges. I invite you to look at Birdability.org to see the many accessibility resources this site offers and to explore the map.

A team of Sea and Sage members has already surveyed more than 40 of the top 100 eBird hotspots in Orange County. Details for each site include an overall accessibility rating, plus specifics on parking, restrooms, trail surfaces and slopes, tactile signs, audio recordings, and more. The information is included on the website map. Enlarge the map to the Southern California area and click on any of the yellow diamonds to see location details. Sea and Sage is scheduling our first accessible birding field trip on Saturday, October 9^{th.} We'll be visiting the San Jacinto Wildlife Area in Riverside County, which is an excellent location for birding from your car. We'll provide an expert leader. Following a morning of birding, we will enjoy a picnic lunch together before heading home. The October 9th Birdability field trip article is now posted on our webpage and will also be in the October Tattler.

Sylvia Ranney Gallagher was born and raised in Santa Ana, then went to Occidental College (BS), Purdue University (MS) and, after ten years of high school

chemistry teaching, UCLA (PhD) for further education, all in chemistry. It was while she was at UCLA and feeling cooped up in the lab doing some rather routine procedures that had to be done every 20 minutes that her mother began feeding her backyard birds and Sylvia began wondering what they were. Figuring out those birds, and others, during those 20-minute breaks was the first step in a life-long obsession.



She was introduced to Sea and

Sage by birding weekly with Carolyn Honer and Fern Zimmerman, both very active members. Before long she was Christmas Count Co-Chair, with Lois Loughran. After a few years, she resigned from that to run the Orange County Breeding Bird Atlas Project (data gathered 1985-1990). From 1980 to the present, her main love has always been her Birding Skills Workshops, visual and aural classes for adults or mature teens of all skill levels. In 1986, she married Jim Gallagher, and for the rest of his life they trailered throughout the US and Canada, with Jim photographing and Sylvia recording birds. You will see and hear some of each in tonight's program.

"Small Mammal Conservation in Southern California Sage Scrub Communities"

Presented by Rachel Y. Chock, Ph.D,

Coastal sage scrub and alluvial fan sage scrub are critical habitat for many of Southern California's endemic species, including the endangered Pacific pocket mouse and San Bernardino kangaroo rat. Rachel will discuss her research on competitive interactions and habitat use and how these are helping to inform conservation translocation and management strategies for these species.

Rachel completed her Ph.D. at UCLA in Ecology and Evolutionary Biology, where she was a two-time recipient of the Sea and Sage Audubon's Bloom-Hays Grant. Rachel is currently a Postdoctoral Associate with the San Diego Zoo Wildlife Alliance.

- 1145 eBird checklists were shared with Sea and Sage.
- The checklists covered 159 locations throughout OC.
- The checklists showed a total of 268 countable species.
- 142,000 individual birds were counted.

Bloom-Hays Ecological Research Grants

Seven excellent student proposals were selected for funding this year by the Sea and Sage Science Committee. The objective of the Bloom-Hays Ecological Research Grant is to advance ecological research. particularly research related to avian species and the natural communities upon which they depend, by providing funds or supplies to support research activities benefitting native species and habitats in Southern California. Sea & Sage Audubon awards \$10,000 in grant funding every spring.

Sea and Sage Audubon Society Birds of Southern California An Introductory Birding Skills Workshop presented by Sylvia Gallagher



Sea and Sage Audubon Society is again offering a ten-week workshop on bird identification for beginning birders or those with a small amount of knowledge, which is most likely disorganized. Professional biologists whose expertise is not in ornithology or whose studies have been confined to just a few species or places will find this workshop helpful, too. Each session will feature about 15 common birds of a particular local habitat on the coastal side of the mountains. With the use of printed worksheets and photos from the Sea and Sage Library, Sylvia Gallagher will help you to learn to identify those birds. In the process, you'll also be introduced to a variety of other topics, such as bird families, plumages and molts, bird topography, distribution and habitat preferences, behavior, vocalizations, the birding literature, birding ethics and etiquette, etc. A second ten-week workshop on Bird Sounds and Their Meaning will immediately follow this one.

The topics to be covered in the series are:

- 1. Birds of neighborhoods.
- 2. Birds of playing fields and parking lots.
- 3. Birds of mudflats and shallow water.
- 4. Birds of the ocean shore.
- 5. Birds of the open country.

6. Birds of prey.

7,8. Birds of the streamside woodland (in 2 parts).

9. Birds of bays, lakes, and marshes.



Each person will attend ten weekly meetings via Zoom. For these, you'll need a computer and good internet access. Each person should have his/her own computer. You will choose one of these three sections to attend:

Wed. evenings: 7:00 - 10:00 p.m., Oct. 6 - Dec. 15, except Nov. 24 Thurs. mornings: 9:00 a.m. - noon, Oct. 7- Dec. 16 except Nov. 25 Thurs. evenings: 7:00 - 10:00 p.m., Oct. 7 - Dec. 16 except Nov. 25

Four half-day field trips to Orange County locations will be scheduled, and you may choose Saturdays or Mondays. The trips will be on Saturday or Monday mornings (your choice) following the third, fifth, seventh, and ninth weeks of class. More information will come later.

To be on the safe side and to accommodate people who don't live close-by, this year's workshops will once again be presented remotely with Zoom. We expect to have back in-person classes next year with probably no Zoom.

The maximum enrollment for each section is 22 If any section does not have at least 12 people enrolled by Sept. 27 it will be canceled. Reserve early though, because some sections may fill quickly. A donation of \$120 (or more) per person is requested, if you can afford it. Enclose at least half of it with your reservation. Installment plan possible for those who can't afford it right now.

The required book for the workshop is the **7th edition** (no other!) of the *National Geographic Field Guide to the Birds of North America* by Dunn and Alderfer. Recommended, but not required, is *Birds of Southern California* by Garrett, Dunn, and Small. Since Sea and Sage's Audubon House bookstore may still be closed due to COVID, you might need to purchase these books from an on-line book seller (not Sea and Sage) or in some other fashion. As workship time approaches, call Audubon House, (949) 261-7963, to see if they are open and stocked with the books. If so, the price will no doubt be quite competitive.

Send your reservation for this workshop, **postmarked no earlier than Sept. 7** (2-day penalty for early reservations), to "Introductory Workshop, Sylvia Gallagher, 21562 Kaneohe Ln., Huntington Beach, CA 92646." Priority for placement in sections will be based on postmark date. **Enclose a LONG (4" x 9½") self-addressed stamped envelope (SASE). Confirmations will be mailed Sept. 29**, including preliminary information.

Shortly after the confirmations are mailed, you will also receive, this time via email, an access code to a portion of Sea and Sage's Dropbox where you will find the workshop's introductory pictures plus the printed material in .pdf form. **YOU WILL HAVE TO PRINT OUT THE TEXTUAL MATERIAL.** Read the document entitled "Read first," the last one in the list, for further information.

Fall Pelagic Trip out of Dana Point ® SUN: Oct. 3rd, 6:30 am – 3:00 pm



Our pelagic trips meet at the Ocean Institute in Dana Point at 6:30 AM; they are 8 hour trips which go along the coast and then out to the 14 mile bank where many of the good birds are, then out to the oil rigs to search for boobies, then back to the coast and south to Dana Point, returning to the dock at 3:00 pm. Our trip will be led by Jon Dunn, an experienced pelagic birder and trip leader, along with his 4 co-leaders: Tom Benson, Robert McNab, Bruce Aird and Steve Morris. <u>Target</u> <u>Birds</u>: Black-vented, Sooty & Pink-footed Shearwaters; Black & Least Storm-Petrels; Cassins & Rhinoceros Auklets; Parasitic & Pomarine Jaegers, Boobies, a variety of shorebirds, terns, gulls, along with some whales & dolphins.

Pre-payment is mandatory; the trip costs \$65 per person. Come join us in Morro Bay, winter home to thousands of shorebirds, many species of raptors and passerines. Our leader, Kaaren Perry, has planned a wonderful weekend of birding and exploration. the many dockside restaurants in the town.

Nature Table at SJWS SAT: September 4th, 9:00 AM – 10:30 AM

While naturalist-led Nature Walks continue to be on hold during the pandemic, we are offering an interim program for visitors to the San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary. On the first Saturday of the month, the Nature Walk naturalists will host a nature display table underneath the tall shady sycamore tree next to the Audubon House. From 9:00 -10:30 AM, visitors to the marsh can talk with naturalists who will share nature tips of what to watch for during selfguided exploration. The display will include taxidermy specimens, identification tips, fun facts, and a take-home craft for young children. Nature Table topics vary depending on the season. Come visit with our Nature Walk naturalists, learn about birds and other wildlife, and then walk the wildlife sanctuary trails in search of what was on display at the Nature Table. If you're lucky, you may even see some of the more uncommon birds at the sanctuary which usually hide when people are around, such as the Greater Roadrunner or the Least Bittern. Join us on a bi-monthly birdwalk to this birdrich and beautiful park nestled in the Chino Hills of north Orange County. The park hosts a wide variety of habitats, including riparian woodland, oak-walnut woodland, coastal sage scrub, and suburban parkland/green space. In total, over 190 species have been seen here, and depending on the time of year, the park hosts bird species such as Hooded Mergansers, Bell's Vireos, Lark Sparrows, Rock Wren, and Lawrence's Goldfinch, as well as all of our common migrant warblers, flycatchers, sparrows, orioles. and others. Birders of all skill levels are welcome. **Directions:** Meet at the picnic tables near the entrance kiosk. Entrance fee is \$5 if you don't have an OC Parks Pass. Spring Migration

To the frustration of local birders, the latter half of the 2021 spring migration did not produce a large quantity of unexpected species, and those that did appear were overwhelmingly the more common vagrants that can be expected to show up in small numbers in every year.

Black Swifts were found at Huntington Central Park on May 21, and at San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary from May 22-23. The **Calliope Hummingbird** that delighted birders in Huntington Central Park for over a month remained until May 2, while a second individual visited a private residence on May 7. Late **Rufous Hummingbirds** were present at Laguna Niguel Regional Park through May 9, and at a private residence in Rancho Santa Margarita until May 11. *Selasphorus* hummingbirds observed between late spring and the end of the year should be presumed to be Allen's Hummingbirds without detailed photo



documentation. A Little Blue Heron at Upper Newport Bay continued through May 14, while a pair of Cattle Egrets were at San

Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary on May 7. A **Gull-Billed Tern** was present at Bolsa Chica Ecological Reserve on May 1, while a migrating **Black Tern** was photographed offshore on May 14. At least one **Franklin's Gull** was reported at Doheny State Beach between May 8 and 13. The **Masked Booby** continued at the Dana Point Jetties until at least May 27th. An immature **Bald Eagle** hung around Huntington Central Park until May 3.

Two migrant flycatchers of note were reported in the county. A **Dusky Flycatcher** was documented at Huntington Central Park from May 1-3. Meanwhile, an **Eastern Kingbird** was reported at Mason Regional Park on May 11 was a one-day wonder and the undisputed high point of spring migration; this was Orange County's 11th confirmed record of this species.

A **Yellow-throated Vireo** was found in Huntington Central Park on May 4th. Meanwhile, **Purple Martins** were observed in flight over San Joaquin WIIdlife Sanctuary on May 23 and over Huntington Central Park on May 19, while **Bank Swallows** were found at San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary from May 15-17. A **Blue-gray Gnatcatcher** at Huntington Central Park on May 15 was an unusually late record for the coast; this species' breeding range in the county is limited to our foothills and mountains. A **Green-tailed Towhee** at Huntington Central Park on May 2nd was unusually late.

Yellow-headed Blackbirds were present at several spots in the county throughout much of May, including at the restored Parkside wetlands near Bolsa Chica Ecological Reserve, and the Orange County Great Park. The only vagrant warblers reported in the county included a pair of **Northern**



Waterthrush through May 2nd, and an Ovenbird from May 23-26, both at Huntington Central Park. Finally, rare cardinalids were represented by a single Summer Tanager at Carbon Canyon Regional Park on May 21, and a Rosebreasted Grosbeak at

Huntington Central Park on June 13.

Summer Visitors

Summer is typically the least interesting period for vagrants in Orange County, as most individuals are well within their typical breeding ranges, defending territories and raising young. Nevertheless, certain birds, in particular oversummering waterfowl and itinerant pelagic species, typically provide some added diversity to our summer residents and breeders, and this year was no exception.

Oversummering ducks in the county included **Bluewinged Teal** at the Upper Santa Ana River, Bolsa Chica Ecological Reserve, and San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary in late June. **Northern Shovelers** were reported at Bolsa Chica Ecological Reserve from June 22 and at Mile Square Regional Park from June23 to July 5.

Undoubtedly the most exciting bird of the summer was a **Short-tailed Albatross** that was found in Los Angeles County waters and

subsequently observed within Orange County waters from June 6-11. This is the first record of this species in Orange County since the *1890s*, and likely represents this species' continued recovery after catastrophic hunting in its breeding colonies led to its near extinction in the 20th century.

A pair of **Black-necked Stilts** at Upper Oso Reservoir in Mission Viejo were unusually far inland for this species. A **Glaucous-winged Gull** and a **Black Tern** were both present at Bolsa Chica



Ecological Reserve on June 27, while a **Laughing Gull** was present on July 9. . A trio of pelagic species off Newport Pier provided good looks for birders: birders chasing a long staying

Pigeon Guillemot that stayed from July 8 through the end of the month, also found a **Northern Fulmar** from July 13-15 and an out of season **Ancient Murrelet** on July 23. Several **Neotropic Cormorants** have been seen reliably early in the morning at San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary, and occasionally at

nearby locations at other times of day. Certainly it is only a matter of time before this species becomes a regular visitor to water features throughout the region. A **Redfooted Booby** was observed on an offshore oil rig on June 12th and 16th.



While **Reddish Egrets** have become regular along the coast, particularly at Bolsa Chica, one observed at Rattlesnake Reservoir was exceptionally far inland. An **American Bittern** at Upper Newport Bay was unexpected for this time of year. **Yellowcrowned Night Herons** summered at several coastal locations throughout the county, including Upper Newport Bay, San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary, Dana Point Harbor, and Talbert Marsh. A Scissor-tailed Flycatcher at Upper Newport Bay on June 27th was the first record since 2013. As might be expected for this highly nomadic species, this proved to be a "one hour wonder". A Wilson's Warbler at San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary on June 19th was presumably the same male that has summered over the past several years, waiting in vain for a mate.

Fall Migration

While the peak of songbird migration will not be for another month at the time of writing, migration of shorebirds and seabirds is already in full swing. Several unusual shorebirds have been observed in the month of July, including a **Baird's Sandpiper** at



Harriett Wieder Regional Park from July 18-23, a **Semipalmated Sandpiper** at San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary on July 28, and a **Solitary Sandpiper** at San Joaquin on July 17.

Potentially multiple Common Terns

were observed at Bolsa Chica Ecological Reserve on July 12, 17, and 20, with a **Black Tern** joining it on July 24. A **Sabine's Gull** was observed off Newport Pier on July 23.

Although the bulk of songbird migration is not for some time, a pair of July observations deserve note. A **White-breasted Nuthatch** on July 21 at Huntington Central Park may be indicative of a smallscale irruption, similar to the one that took place in 2018-2019. Finally, A **Yellow-headed Blackbird** was observed at Grijalva Park in Orange on July 16.

With permission from the Board of Directors for Sea and Sage Audubon and Irvine Ranch Water District, the Audubon Naturalists and I were able to offer 3 educational programs on a limited basis at the San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary in July and August. We were vaccinated and wore masks and created distance between us for safety during the on-going pandemic. Success!

Nature Walk Table – Hummingbirds: On the first Saturday in July and August, we talked with 27 and 35 visitors respectively. Coordinator Linda Thomas, Susan Gibb, Gloria Markussen, and Margaret Renton helped visitors identify Anna's and Allen's Hummingbirds, showed real nests, and gave out children's crafts and Hummingbirds of Orange County brochures. Tell your friends to drop by on the first Saturday in September and October as we continue the Nature Walk Table with a new nature theme!



Nature Day Camps: We met under the shade of a huge cottonwood tree for 3 half-day week-long camp programs for 43 children in July. We took daily walks, kept a daily nature journal, solved mystery bird posters, and competed in Birdathon on the last day. We learned about riparian habitat, migratory pathways, and food webs. We painted shirts, life-size American Avocets, and small wooden songbirds. It was a lot of fun!

We appreciate coordinators Deborah Brin, Carolyn Noble, and Bev Spring for their hard work plus naturalists Ann Barbour, Rudi Berkelhamer, Teresa Cullen, Jenny Golden, Chris Holland, Babs Levitan, Maya Matkin, Jay Miller, Marquita Miller, Brenda Sabin, Debbie Spurr, Stephanie Tanton, Pat Vranicar and Mary Ellen Wynn. We were grateful for our Junior Naturalist teens: William Balducci, Cathy Ellsworth, Anna Fuerbach, Beverly Nemeth, Clark Noble, Isabelle Speakman, Luke Speakman, Kyle Okino and Julia Wong. Former camper and Humboldt State University graduate Maia Nguyen returned to help several days, and Board member and biologist Samuel Bressler talked about science careers with the campers.

One parent wrote about camp: "My son has enjoyed being around other people who love birds and wildlife as much as he does.



THANK YOU for bringing camp back this summer!" One child wrote: "I liked the nature walks because we saw a lot of different birds and we saw different parts of the marsh." We identified 61-84 bird species total!

Summer Bats: We offered four Summer Bat Walks in August and I led the first one for 12 adults and children. We began next to shallow Pond E where we displayed two taxidermy bats to show their size and how to identify between them by wing shape and tail membrane. We then walked to two locations where we saw an

ABUNDANCE of foraging Yuma Myotis bats and Mexican Freetailed Bats. It was so exhilarating to have dozens of bats flying over us and between us. We also saw coyotes, terns and skimmers plus flocks of Canada Geese and crows coming to roost for the night at the wetland.
