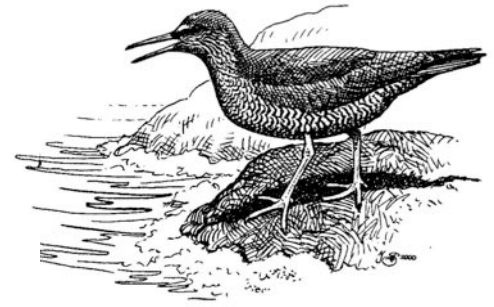

Audubon & Climate Change Actions

Audubon believes that climate change is the #1 threat to birds. What are National Audubon Society (NAS) and Audubon California doing to address it, and how can we join in efforts to make a difference?

National Audubon Society works with federal and state lawmakers to achieve common sense solutions to climate change. *Current campaigns include:* 1) protection of landscapes that birds need to survive and that can naturally store carbon; 2) support for a transition to 100% clean electricity; 3) setting binding emission reduction targets and 4) support for technology innovations that will reduce greenhouse gases.

Audubon CA is working with state legislators to support programs that contribute to reducing the impacts of climate change on birds and their habitats. State priorities include 1) using regenerative grazing to sequester carbon and increase grassland climate resiliency and grassland bird habitat; 2) estuary conservation; 3) forage fish conservation; 4) marine bird monitoring; 5) renewable energy, influencing state climate policy and plans; 6) bird-friendly solutions at the Salton Sea; 7) Climate-smart native plant gardening and restoration in urban areas; 8) living shoreline restoration; 9) and at Starr Ranch, the monitoring and collecting of data on climate change impacts.

How can you help? When you receive a *Call to Action* from NAS or Audubon CA, take the time to respond. We are assured by our state and national leaders that our voices actually make a difference in the outcome.

Sea and Sage Audubon

Our new **Climate Change Committee** is a subcommittee of Conservation. "We will strive to educate ourselves and our community about issues impacting climate at all levels, including habitat creation and preservation, personal choices, organizational decisions, and public policy." This committee meets monthly to identify concrete steps that we can each take to make a difference. Suggestions will appear in the Tattler and in other communications as Climate Tips, with topics such as what's really happening with recycling, conserving water, avoiding single use plastics, reducing food waste, and other ways to reduce our carbon footprints.

Our new **Legislation and Advocacy Committee**, another subcommittee of Conservation, is working to "expand our program of outreach to elected officials and expand our engagement of chapter members with more training and more opportunities for them to communicate directly to office holders at all levels".

“Homegrown National Park ” presented by Doug Tallamy



Our parks, preserves, and remaining wildlands – no matter how grand in scale – are too small and separated from one another to sustain the native trees, plants, insects and animals on which our ecosystems depend. We can fix this problem by practicing conservation outside of wildlands, where we live, work, shop, and farm. Thus, the concept for **Homegrown** National park: a national challenge to create diverse ecosystems in our yards, communities, and surrounding lands by reducing lawn, planting native, and removing invasives. The goal of HNP is to create a national movement to restore 20 million acres with natives, an area representing ½ of what is now in lawn. We are at a critical point where we are losing so many native plant and animal species that our natural life support is in jeopardy.

However, if many people make small changes, we can restore healthy ecological networks and weather the changes ahead.

Orange County Rarities

March is often considered the “slow season” of local birding, as we have all become familiar with the continuing winter vagrants, and spring has not yet brought a fresh flush of rarities. Nevertheless, continued observations of the winterers provides valuable information about how long they stay in Orange County before departing for the north. Furthermore, as seen below, diligent searching can turn up the earliest crop of spring migrants.

The wintering **Mexican Duck** at the Carr Park duck pond was last seen on March 11th. **White-winged Scoters** and **Long-tailed Ducks** continued off of Newport Beach, particularly Newport Pier throughout the month.

A **Neotropic Cormorant** continued on the Pond 1 island in San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary through March 14th. A pair of boobies were seen off our coast in late March: a **Brown Booby** on March 27th and a **Nazca Booby** on

March 31st. An onshore **Black-legged Kittiwake** on March 17th was a remarkable record for this normally highly pelagic gull. The Upper Newport Bay **Little Blue Heron** was present through

the end of the month, while the less frequently observed **Tricolored Heron** was last seen on the 19th. The Huntington Beach **Bald Eagle** continued shuffling between Bolsa Chica Ecological Reserve and Huntington Central Park. It was last seen at the former site on the 17th. It then likely resurfaced at Talbert Regional Park on the 30th and San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary on the 31st. This individual's continued wanderings will likely be a staple of this column for some time to come.

Yellow-bellied Sapsuckers continued at Vintage Park in Lake Forest through March 9th, and at Laguna Niguel Regional Park through March 22nd. The Irvine Regional Park **Lewis's Woodpecker** continued through the end of the month, while others were seen at O'Neill Regional Park on March 5th, and Featherly Regional Park on March 15th.

Hammond's Flycatchers continued at Pinecrest Park through the end of the month and at Oso Creek Trail through March 25th. One first seen at Serrano Creek Park on March 20th may have been an early spring migrant. A **Gray Flycatcher** was found at Irvine Regional Park on March 21st. The Chrisanta Drive **Brown-crested Flycatcher** in Mission Viejo continued through March 22nd, while a **Tropical Kingbird** was seen in the Bolsa

Chica Ecological Reserve/Harriett Wieder Regional Park area through March 13th.

Plumbeous Vireos at Craycraft Park in Mission Viejo and Serrano Creek Park on the 29th may have been overlooked wintering individuals or relatively uncommon spring migrants. A **Bank Swallow** at Laguna Niguel Regional Park on March 4th was definitely a spring migrant, just unusually early. The wintering **Varied Thrush** at Irvine Regional Park was last seen on March 12th, while the wintering **Mountain Bluebird** at Quail Hill was last seen on March 3rd.

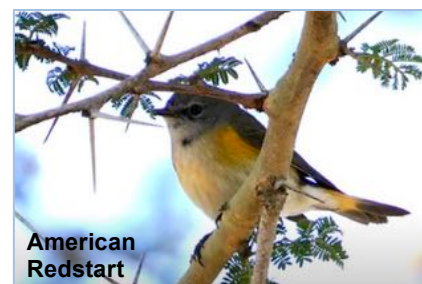
A motley crew of wintering sparrows persisted in the county until various points throughout the month. The Clark Regional Park **Clay-colored Sparrow** was seen through March 12th, while one continued at a private residence in Placentia through the 20th. A third bird reported at El Toro Memorial Park March 29th-31st may have been an overlooked wintering individual or an early migrant. The **Harris's Sparrow** at Tustin Legacy Park continued to hang out with White-crowned Sparrows throughout the month. **White-throated Sparrows** continued at Aurora Park through March 2nd, in Vintage Park and a Buena Park residence through March 11th, Russell Cook Park through the 26th, meaning that Orange County continued to host all four species of North

American *Zonotrichia* sparrows in March. The wintering **Vesper Sparrows** were seen along the Puma Ridge Trail in Irvine Regional Park through the end of the month, though the one along the Arroyo Trabuco was last seen on March 3rd. A **Green-tailed Towhee** at Talbert Regional Park March 21-23 may have been a spring migrant.

On the other hand, most of the unusual warblers seemed to have departed the county before the beginning of March, and they were not replaced by any fresh spring vagrants. The only notable exceptions were a **Black-and-white Warbler** that continued through March 21st, and an **American Redstart** at San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary through March 20th.

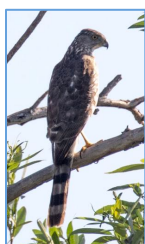

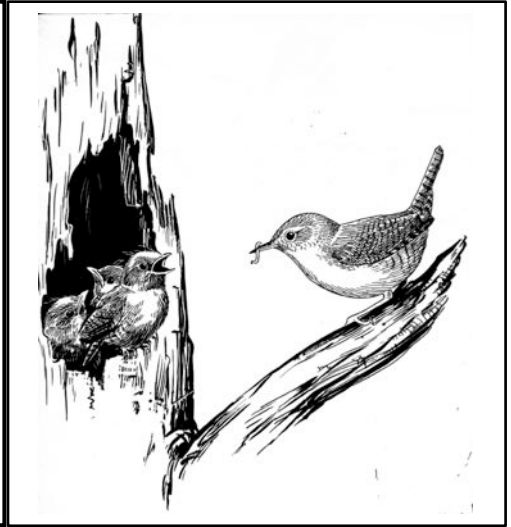
