Our New Website Has Launched

For the past 2 years, an ambitious committee of Board members has been working tirelessly on the creation and development of a new website for Sea and Sage Audubon Society. The leadership for this project was Darrell Wilson, having retired from a 40-year career in software development.

More than half of his career included project leadership and management roles.

Darrell started the effort by connecting us with WordPress, a widely used platform for website implementation. A consultant considered our needs, identified a set of development tools for us and produced a simple prototype that got us started. From that point on, Darrell was pretty much on our his own to prioritize our goals and begin the website design.

Committee Chairs were all involved in the evaluation of current content and the development of new content for this website. Committee members made Important decisions about what should be included and what was missing. We often asked ourselves, "What do our members want to know and how can we make what they need more accessible?" Decisions were made about layout, menus, links, the use of color, fonts, and which photos to include that would tell our story. The prototype was continually adjusted as these decisions were made. A major challenge was creating a website that was versatile enough to be accessed on multiple devices, particularly cell phones. This was a complex design issue, and we hope we have met this challenge successfully.

After more than a decade we are pleased to welcome back Rick Halsey, Director of the California Chaparral Institute. In his prior talk, Rick spoke about the fire ecology of chaparral. Rick returns to share additional thoughts on the special nature of this local treasure.

Here are some words from Rick: "For more than two million years we evolved outside, in nature, driven by our instincts. Over the last several thousand years, our newly conscious minds have tried to reconcile the conflict between the demands of civilization, social expectations, and our ancient, wild selves. Yet despite our best efforts, the conflict persists, causing many of the personal, social, and environmental problems we face today. Nature provides the remedy

"Join us as we explore how connecting with Nature through our local native habitats, especially the chaparral, offers us a way to achieve what so many philosophers through the ages have identified as essential to achieving a meaningful existence – to "know thyself".

Halsey is a writer, philosopher, photographer, and a guide to help others reconnect with nature. He has given over 500 presentations and written numerous books, papers and articles over the past 15 years about the importance of chaparral and connecting with nature. He works with the San Diego Museum of Natural History and teaches natural history throughout the state. The second edition of his book, *Fire, Chaparral, and Survival in Southern California,* received an award from San Diego Book Awards Assoc.

"Puente-Chino Hills Christmas Bird Count: an opportunity to study the bird life of Northern Orange County" presented by Samuel Bressler

North Orange County boasts a diverse array of ecosystems, including coastal sage scrub, chaparral, grassland, oak-walnut riparian woodlands, freshwater wetlands, rivers and lakes, and urban parkland. This habitat diversity is reflected in the wide variety of threatened and unusual species found in the region, from the California Gnatcatchers and Cactus Wrens of West Coyote Hills to the Common Mergansers and Bald Eagles of the Santa Ana River. Yet avian status and trends of birds in northern Orange County and adjacent parts of Los Angeles and San Bernardino counties are poorly understood compared to other parts of the Los Angeles Metropolis.

Last year, a first step towards a more comprehensive understanding of North Orange County avifauna was taken with the establishment of Sea and Sage's new Puente-Chino Hills Christmas Bird Count. So now, the data from this region – previously the only part of the county not covered by the CBC – will contribute to the CBC's massive database, while also providing baseline information and trend lines in the community in response to threats such as climate change, drought, wildfire, and urbanization.

In this presentation, Sam will discuss the origin, establishment and operations of this circle; share findings from the pilot and first official counts; and pose questions about the birdlife in northern Orange County that we hope to answer as the count becomes an integrated part of Sea and Sage's ongoing bird survey program.

Tackling Climate and Trash Has organics recycling come to your community? If it's available in your town, do you hear, "Why should I bother with



this?" Recalling Project Drawdown's Top 20 High Impact Actions for Households and Individuals, the Tackling Climate and

Trash subcommittee (TCT) has researched organics and put together information to help inform us all about this change in our recycling programs, which will help to answer the questions.

The short answer to "why recycle organics?" is <u>to reduce</u> <u>greenhouse gases</u>! SB 1383, the California organics recycling law, went into effect in January 2022 but is being implemented in different ways and on different schedules by Orange County trash haulers. Here are some Fast Facts on why the recycling of organics is so important:

- Organic waste contributes 11% of the world's greenhouse gas emissions
- Organics make up half of what we dump in landfills
- Landfills are the third largest source of humanrelated methane emissions in the U.S.
- The hope is that implementation of this law will lead to a reduction of organic waste sent to landfills by 75% by 2025

Look for more facts in the months to come.

Trude Hurd, Project Director of Education Share Nature with School Children at SJWS

If you are looking for a rewarding place to volunteer, then consider joining our Outdoor Adventures team. Santa Ana children have few opportunities for field trips to natural habitat, and our program provides a much-needed service. For children to better understand the importance of wetlands and how their actions can help the environment, we need enough volunteer naturalists to make this happen. Can you help?

You don't have to be a birding expert, scientist, or schoolteacher to volunteer. Our thorough training classes will help you with the basics of assisting an Outdoor Adventures program. You don't need to know every bird in the pond because we are more interested in teaching children HOW to identify the bird by observing its field marks. If you haven't used a microscope since high school, no worries. Our microscopes are easy to use, and we see the same 6 small invertebrates every tour. Not sure you will "know enough"? Children don't want a detailed lecture from a know-it-all; they just want a friendly conversation with you about nature.

Yes, we work hard during the 2½ hour program, but we also have a lot of fun. We see joy on children's faces as they use binoculars and microscopes for the first time. Their faces light up when they see a Great Blue Heron walking on the path in front of them. We laugh together at some of the birds' antics. We cheer when a tern actually catches a fish after numerous attempts. We hear happiness in the children's voices as they realize they can return to the marsh with their families for free. We go home with a proud feeling that we may have changed the life of a child that day.

BIRDS OF SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA

An Introductory Birding Skills Workshop Presented by Sylvia Gallagher

Sea and Sage Audubon Society is again offering a ten-week workshop on bird identification for beginning birders or those with a small amount of knowledge, which is most likely disorganized. Professional biologists whose expertise is not in ornithology or whose studies have been confined to just a few species or places will find this workshop helpful, too. Each session will feature about 15 common birds of a particular local habitat on the coastal side of the mountains. With the use of printed worksheets and photos from the Sea and Sage Library, Sylvia Gallagher will help you to learn to identify those birds. In the process, you'll also be introduced to a variety of other topics, such as bird families, plumages and molts, bird topography, distribution and habitat preferences, behavior, vocalizations, the birding literature, birding ethics and etiquette, etc.

The topics to be covered in the series are:

- 1. Birds of neighborhoods.
- 2. Birds of playing fields and parking lots.
- 3. Birds of mudflats and shallow water.
- 4. Birds of the ocean shore.
- 5. Birds of the open country.
- 6. Birds of prey.
- 7,8. Birds of the streamside woodland (in 2 parts).

9. Birds of bays, lakes, and marshes.

Each person will attend ten weekly meetings via Zoom. For these, you'll need a computer and good internet access. Each person should have his/her own computer. You will choose one of these three sections to attend:

Wed. 7:00 - ca. 10:00 p.m., Oct. 5 - Dec. 14 except Nov. 23 Thurs. 9:00 a.m. - ca. noon, Oct. 6- Dec. 15 except Nov. 24 Thurs. 7:00 - ca. 10:00 p.m., Oct. 6 - Dec. 15 except Nov. 24

Four half-day field trips to Orange County locations will be scheduled, and you may choose Saturdays or Mondays. See dates below. Participants will be divided into small groups of 7-10 people with an experienced leader. See enrollment form (below) for dates and indicate your preferences. COVID-19 immunization required to participate in field trips. The places will be Huntington Central Park (FT #1), Crescent Bay Point & Upper Newport Bay (FT #2), Irvine Regional Park (FT #3), and Yorba Regional Park (FT #4), all Orange County locations. Except for FT#2, which depends on the tides, the trips will run from 8:00 am till around noon.

To be on the safe side and to accommodate people who don't live close-by this workshop is presented remotely via Zoom.

The maximum enrollment for each section is 22 If any section does not have at least 12 people enrolled by Sept. 26 it will be canceled. Reserve early though because some sections may fill quickly. A donation of \$120 (or more) per person, payable to Sea and Sage Audubon, is requested, if you can afford it. Enclose at least half of it with your reservation.

Installment plan possible for those who can't afford it right now.

The required book for the workshop is the **7th edition** (no other!) of the *National Geographic Field Guide to the Birds of North America* by Dunn and Alderfer. Recommended, but not required, is *Birds of Southern California* by Garrett, Dunn, and Small. These books are available in the Sea and Sage Audubon Bookstore, open daily from 8:00 am till 4:00 pm.

Send your reservation (see form below) for this workshop, **postmarked no earlier than Sept. 6** (2-day penalty for early reservations), to "Introductory Workshop, Sylvia Gallagher, 21562 Kaneohe Ln., Huntington Beach, CA 92646." Priority for placement in sections will be based on postmark date. **Enclose a LONG (4" x 9½") self-addressed stamped envelope (SASE). Confirmations will be mailed Sept. 28**, including preliminary information.

Shortly after the confirmations are mailed, you will also receive, this time via email, an access code to a portion of Sea and Sage's Dropbox where you will find the workshop's introductory pictures plus the printed material in .pdf form. **YOU WILL HAVE TO PRINT OUT THE TEXTUAL MATERIAL.** Read first the document entitled "Read first" for further information. It will not be the first one on the list of attachments!

Orange County Rarities

June and July are not the twitcher's favorite months, for good reason. While birds may wander off-course from their usual range during migration and winter with little consequence, those that stray during the breeding season miss out on the chance to mate and raise young; repeat offenders are thus rapidly removed from the gene pool. Early June sometimes brings straggling passerines that have perhaps taken a circuitous route north, this year however was an exception. Nevertheless, as with any rule in ecology, there are exceptions, whether it's shorebirds that have already finished nesting and have taken to the wing for an early fall migration, or wandering pelagic species, who's migratory routes and quirks are as poorly known as some of their breeding biology. Also, a fixture of early to mid-summer vagrant chasing are certain waders and cormorants who push north from Mexico in poorly understood dispersal events. Thus, while June and July lack some of the mystique of May or October, they are not entirely without surprises.

A White-winged Dove was found at the Fullerton Arboretum on June 22nd. North America's most reliable Ruff was re-spotted once again along the Upper Santa Ana River on July 16th and was last seen on the 19th. Typically, this bird sticks around until at least mid-September. A pair of Solitary Sandpipers were at San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary on July 30th, while a Surfbird, normally an obligate inhabitant of rocky beaches along the immediate coast, graced Bolsa Chica Ecological Reserve July 31st, thus rounding up an interesting trio of unusual shorebirds.

A **Common Murre** was found at Newport Pier July 23rd; this common winter offshore species is nevertheless an unexpected winter visitor. A **Laysan Albatross** observed from a whale watching boat was Orange County's third record, and the first in five years. A **Manx Shearwater** (a seventh county record) was found on a pelagic trip out of Dana Point on June 24th; this species is probably more common than typically reported; however, this species can be devilishly difficult to distinguish from other more common light-bellied shearwater species, particularly in poor lighting conditions. Another pelagic bird-watching boat trip on July 31st produced a handful of unusual pelagic species, most notably a **Leach's Storm-Petrel** (typically only found much farther offshore beyond Orange County waters), but also a **Long-tailed Jaeger** and an **Ashy Storm-Petrel**.

By far the most notable species found this summer was a presumed **Arctic Loon** at the Huntington Beach Pier on June 18th. While the ultimate question of this bird's identification lies with the California Bird Records Committee, available photographs support this species over the closely related (And far more common) Pacific Loon. If this report is accepted this will be the second record of this species in Orange County, and one of about twenty California!

A **Tricolored Heron** was reported from Upper Newport Bay on June 23rd, possibility the same individual that spent the previous winter there. A **Cattle Egret** was at Bolsa Chica Ecological Reserve June 9th-10th. **Neotropic Cormorants** once again returned to summer at San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary and were present throughout both months.

Vagrant passerines were few and far between in the county during the summer, as expected for this time of year. A **Tennessee Warbler** was found in Huntington Beach June 25th, while **Summer Tanagers** were at Crystal Cove State Park July 26th and at Mile Square Regional Park July 31st. *This early trickle of fall migrants will soon be reinforced by many more days shorten through August turns to September, and the northern part of the continent releases both exhausted adults and spry first-years, all bound for warmer climates.*

Directions to the San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary (5 Riparian View, Irvine)

Our entrance is from Campus Dr., not Michelson

From the San Diego Fwy (405): Exit on Jamboree, south toward Newport Beach. At the 1st signal, Michelson, turn left. Continue on Michelson (past the old entrance to the SJWS) to the 5th signal which is Harvard and turn right. Drive to University & turn right. Drive to Campus Drive & turn right. Stay in the far-right lane and immediately turn right onto Riparian View which will enter the San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary. The entrance road is marked by a small sign. If you miss the turn and reach Carlson, turn right and go around the block again to Harvard. The sanctuary is open every day from dawn until dusk.


