Why are we using Eventbrite?

As an organization, we are moving away from the time-consuming process of writing checks and sending in registration forms by mail. With Eventbrite, the payments transfer to Sea and Sage automatically and a list of participants is generated as people sign up. The participant list will include email addresses of all participants, so they can be contacted for any follow up needed. Trip leaders can also communicate details about the trip or last minute changes.

We hope that you will applaud this change in our registration processes. There will certainly be some glitches, but we believe that the days of check writing are ending. Many people do not even have a checking account these days. We can all save some money on postage stamps and envelopes.

General Meeting – Online Presentation Friday, October 21, 2022 – 7:00 PM "Bird-tripping: Tales from the Road to Tuktoyaktuk" Presented by Devon Bradley, Ph.D.

In the summer of 2022, Devon Bradley packed up her binoculars, camera, and pup to go all the way to the shores of the Arctic Ocean. Inspired, in part, by Sylvia Gallagher's "Trip Diaries", Devon carved a circuitous route to Alaska, on a ribbon of a road that traverses two mountain ranges, extensive subarctic wilderness, and the breeding habitats of some incredible species of birds, on its way to the Mackenzie Delta and Tuktoyaktuk! In this presentation, Devon will share highlights and anecdotes from this 2.5-month journey.

Devon Bradley is an ecologist, naturalist, birder, photographer, traveler, and all-around-natureenthusiast. After completing a Ph.D. in Ecology and Evolutionary Biology from Brown University, Devon made her way to Southern California for a post-doctoral research position at UC Irvine. For the past 12 years, Devon has been a Professor of Biology at Irvine Valley College.

'4th Tues.' Conservation Lecture Tuesday, October 25th 7:00 PM by Zoom

"The SCRV is for the Birds!"

presented by Rachel E. Bockrath

Our speaker, Rachel Bockrath, a master's student at Cal Poly Pomona, has been surveying the avian communities across six major habitats in the Santa Clara River Valley (SCRV) to compare the community compositions between habitats, and over seasons. Rachel is eager to share her research results which a Sea and Sage Bloom-Hays Research grant, helped fund.

Having now completed a whole year of surveys, and her second spring and summer season, Rachel has uncovered intriguing similarities and differences between the riparian, scrub, orchard, orchard edge, suburban, and urban habitats.

Not to give too much away, but the species common throughout the SCRV and the species that are restricted to certain habitats may surprise you! In addition to discovering community-level trends, Rachel is investigating changes in avian activity between habitats and the ecosystem services birds provide in the orchards.

Tackling Climate and Trash (continuing

info on Organics Recycling). Organic Wastes include yard waste, wood and paper products, and food. Trash collection companies are required by California law to start up new programs this year to collect and process organic wastes.





Organic wastes have many uses in their recycled or processed forms. Composting facilities provide soil amendments like compost, liquid fertilizer, and mulch. Anaerobic digestion facilities can convert organic waste into biofuel and electricity.

How can we help with organic food waste?

- First, waste less! Some people find that planning carefully or shopping more often helps them reduce food waste.
- Compost at home, either with backyard composting or using vermiculture (red wiggler worms!) – but note that you should only compost vegetable matter, not meat or pasta or dairy.
- Collect your food wastes and add them to your bin, following the instructions of your trash collection company (programs vary so check with your city).

Each year, school children sit inches from taxidermy bird specimens to learn about bird adaptations. Camp children learn about the diversity of birds through our specimens. An introductory Birding Skills Workshop Presented by Sylvia Gallagher on Zoom

This is a condensed version of the announcement that ran in Sept. The full announcement is on the website under Education/Birding Skills Workshop, then click on blue printing for announcement.

Sea and Sage Audubon Society is again offering a ten-week workshop on bird identification for beginning birders. Each session will feature about 15 common birds of a particular local habitat on the coastal side of the mountains.

Each person will attend ten weekly meetings via Zoom. You will choose one of these three sections to attend:

Wednesdays- 7:00 - 10:00 p.m., PST. Oct. 5 - Dec. 14 except Nov. 23

Thursdays- 9:00 a.m. - noon, PST.

Oct. 6- Dec. 15 except Nov. 24

Thursdays- 7:00 - ca. 10:00 p.m., PST.

Oct. 6 - Dec. 15 except Nov. 24

Four half-day field trips to Orange County locations will be scheduled, and you may choose Saturdays or Mondays. See dates below.

A donation of \$120 (or more) per person, payable to Sea and Sage Audubon, is requested, if you can afford it. Enclose at least half of it with your reservation. An installment plan is possible for those who can't afford it right now. The required book for the workshop is the **7th** edition (no other!) of the National Geographic Field Guide to the Birds of North America by Dunn and Alderfer.

Orange County Rarities

While a few birds, including swifts, kingbirds, and doves, continue breeding into August, most have already raised this year's young, and will instead spend the month undergoing their annual molt. replacing old feathers worn down by spring migration and rearing young. This molt is particularly essential for long-distance migrants, and many species will stage for weeks in suitable habitat until their new flight feathers are ready for the long journey south. August also marks the peak migration for shorebirds; most will already be in Latin America by the time songbird migration begins in earnest, but for now they rest and refuel in our estuaries, riverbeds and marshes. Finally, August brings a variety of rare seabirds north from Baja California and the Pacific coast of Mexico, likely drawn by the warm waters and at last unchained from their own breeding colonies.

A White-winged Dove was at Mile Square Regional Park on August 17th. One to two Pacific Golden-Plovers were found at Bolsa Chica Ecological Reserve on August 10th, with one continuing through August 22nd. A Stilt Sandpiper at San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary on August 16th was the rarest shorebird of the month, while a Semipalmated Sandpiper at the same location on August 11th was the only record in the county this fall; typically 2-3 can be found in most years. Single Baird's Sandpipers were found in back areas of Bolsa Chica Ecological Reserve on August 19th and August 31st. Red Phalaropes, normally our most "pelagic" shorebird, were found at Talbert Marsh from August 1st-6th and at Bolsa Chica on August 10th, while a lingering Solitary Sandpiper continued at San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary August 5th.

The August 13th pelagic trip off Dana Point produced at least four **Craveri's Murrelets**, and a **Pigeon Guillemot** was seen off Newport Pier on August 19th. Also found on the August 13th pelagic trip were an incredible *thirteen* **Sabine's Gulls**, and five **Long-tailed Jaegers**, both high counts for these two rare but regular offshore migrant species. Both species were also seen offshore on a separate pelagic trip on August 5th.

August is the best time of year to see a variety of uncommon tropical and subtropical storm-petrel species, and this year certainly did not disappoint. The August 13th pelagic produced an incredible four species of storm-petrel, including two Least Storm-Petrels (the first in almost ten years), five Ashy Storm-Petrels, and seven Leach's Storm-Petrels. This last species is staging an unprecedented intrusion into Orange County waters, which have traditionally been considered too shallow for this deep-water species. The August 5th pelagic produced two other Ashy storm-petrels as well as a purported Townsend's Storm-Petrel, a very close relative of Leach's known to breed only on Guadalupe Island off the coast of Baja California. A Red-billed Tropicbird seen on an August 27th whale watching boat off Newport Beach was unexpected.

Reddish Egrets have become regular visitors to several coastal estuaries over the last two decades, particularly Bolsa Chica Ecological Reserve. However, one at San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary August 28th is one of very few inland records. A more unexpected late summer visitor to San Joaquin was a **Cattle Egret** on August 19th.
