

#### **Bolsa Chica Break-ins Update**

Car break-ins and thefts at the Bolsa Chica Ecological Reserve (BCER) have been an ongoing concern for all birders who come to visit this important birding hotspot. Two years ago, Sea and Sage Audubon formed a special Break-ins Committee, chaired by Tom Van Huss, with Vic Leipzig, Trude Hurd and myself, to develop a plan of action. We began by taking a survey to identify the extent of the problem. Then, working in collaboration with Melissa Borde, the BCER manager for the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW), Chief Parra and Lt. Nesmith of the Huntington Beach Police Department, and Dan Kalmic, HB City Councilman, we are pleased to provide an update on the progress that has been made.

- 1. New signs have been posted at BCER.
- 2. HBPD has provided their contact phone number, for visitors to report an incident or any suspicious activity.
- 3. A company called Flock Safety, will be installing a security camera that captures images of license plates and will forward these directly to HBPD. These cameras are already in use in other locations in HB and have assisted the HBPD in solving numerous crimes. In addition, The HB City Council has approved a budget proposal to install a video surveillance camera high on the light pole in the south parking lot.
- 4. CDFW is now working with the three lead BCER non-profit groups (Amigos de Bolsa Chica, Bolsa Chica Land Trust, and Bolsa Chica Conservancy), along with Sea and Sage Audubon Society, to fund and support the development of a Reserve Watch Program. The goal is to build community respect for the habitats of the Reserve and to encourage the people who visit BCER to follow the rules that protect it. This program will create a positive presence at Bolsa Chica, as trained naturalists interact with visitors, teaching them about the value of this special place and how to preserve it for future generations.





#### General Meeting - Online Presentation Friday, November 18<sup>th</sup> - 7:00 PM Via Zoom

"Conservation of the Coastal Cactus Wren in Southern California" presented by Barbara E. Kus, Ph.D.

"Soft and low it comes, a rich yodelling alto of uniform tone – uniform, that is, save for the light crescendo with which the series opens, and the fading murmur of its closing note." William L. Dawson (1923), The Birds of California.

Visitors to coastal sage scrub and desert habitats of southern California may recognize this as the song of one of our most endearing and enigmatic resident bird species: the Cactus Wren (Campylorhyncus brunneicapillus). One hundred years after Dawson penned these words, the Coastal Cactus Wren is now one our most imperiled species and the focus of widespread conservation attention. Cactus Wren numbers have declined over the past few decades as urbanization has claimed the cactus habitat upon which wrens depend, leaving them in small, isolated populations surrounded by a sea of development. Wrens and their habitat are further threatened by wildfire and drought, both predicted to increase in frequency and intensity with climate change. Dr. Barbara Kus will present some highlights of the research that she and her colleagues have been conducting to identify threats to Cactus Wrens and guide management to ensure the species' persistence.

"Greenprints & RAMPS: Ways to Find & Fund Conservation & Climate Projects"

#### **Presented by Melanie Schlotterbeck**

Through the regional non-profit Friends of Harbors, Beaches and Parks (FHBP) - Green Vision Coordinator, Melanie Schlotterbeck - is changing the approach to conservation through partnerships and new tools. FHBP's claim to fame is the use of its Green Vision Map, which outlines the wish list of properties in need of protection. The first real use of the map was the conservation of lands by a transportation agency through a negotiated mitigation program. FHBP is attempting to replicate the partnership with a six-countywide regional planning agency that could bring in one billion dollars for conservation mitigation using a regional Greenprint -a digital decision-making tool. And, as if this wasn't exciting enough, the state has launched an initiative to protect 30% of California's natural lands and coastal waters by 2030 (aka 30x30). California has never had as much money for conservation as it does right now. FHBP and Sea and Sage Audubon are both part of the Southland 30x30 Coalition working to protect lands in three priority areas: biodiversity, access, and climate resilience. Attend this presentation to get inspired, learn how useful and innovative tools can conserve lands, how mitigation programs and creative partnerships meet conservation objectives, and how aligning with state goals and priorities can further protect wild spaces.



**Melanie Schlotterbeck** is the Green Vision Project Coordinator for Friends of Harbors, Beaches and Parks.

(FHBP) and manages multiple coalitions that advance projects locally and regionally. In addition to working with FHBP, she also consults with other non-profits locally, regionally, and statewide to improve the public's understanding of the inter-relationships between housing, climate, transportation, and conservation. Currently, she is in her second term on the Brea Planning Commission. In August, she was appointed by the Secretary of Natural Resources to serve on the 30x30 Partnership Coordinating Committee, which connects non-profits to the 30x030 campaign.

#### **Tackling Holiday Trash**

Happy Holidays! We love holidays and it is disturbing to learn we discard 25% more trash between Thanksgiving and New Year's than at any other time of year. This year, as you make your holiday plans, think conservation and trash control. We know you have your own ideas, but here are some of ours (more at our website).

- Holiday greetings. Consider email greeting "cards". If you buy paper cards, check they're recyclable (no glitter, metallics, or sequins) and that photo cards are printed on card stock rather than non-recyclable photo paper.
- Gifts. Consider a holiday focus on family activities rather than so much on gifts. Participate together in a Christmas Bird Count! Give a gift of your time, of services or a shared experience, or give gift cards instead of a package. Make something special rather than buying a gift.
- Wrappings. Try using alternative wrappings for your gifts such as colorful Sunday comic pages, reusable decorative tins, fabric bags, baskets, or boxes. Look for papers made from recycled paper, or make sure the paper you buy can be recycled – no metallics, velvet flocking, or glitter.
- Shopping and deliveries. When you shop, be sure to carry your reusable bags. For online orders, group purchases to minimize packaging.
- Entertaining. Eliminate single use plastics, and whenever possible, choose reusable tableware.
   Offer a water station instead of disposable water bottles.

If we each make a few changes, together we can make a substantive change in the trash that goes to our landfills.

## Orange County Rarities by Samuel Bressler

With the breaking of Summer's feverish grip upon our county, finally arrives the onslaught of southbound songbirds, who flee the specter of northern Winters, for warmer, gentler climes. This report can only summarize a fraction of the remarkable diversity of vagrants that have graced our county thus far.

A **Greater Scaup** at San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary from September 9th-11th was exceptional both for its inland location and its early arrival. **Baird's Sandpipers** were found at Newland Marsh on September 5th, while **Pectoral Sandpiper** turned up at several wetlands throughout the month, including San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary, Bolsa Chica Ecological Reserve, and Seal Beach National Wildlife Refuge.

The healthy numbers of **Long-tailed Jaeger** seen in our offshore waters in August continued into September, with individuals seen on offshore pelagic boat trips on September 23rd and 25th. An **Ancient Murrelet** was found (and accidentally hooked by an unsuspecting fisherman) on September 19th at Newport Pier, as was a **Common Murre** on September 24th. **Least Terns** are quite easy to find in spring and summer in and around their breeding colonies, but are almost always gone by mid-August; one at Bolsa Chica Ecological Reserve September 9th-11th was an exceptionally late straggler.

Hurricane Kay had already dissipated before reaching as far north as Orange County, but the unusual storm still pushed some tropical pelagic species north into our waters over the 4th of July weekend. A mind-blowing thirty Least Storm-petrels (a species, that, prior to this year, had not been seen in the county in almost a decade), were seen off Newport Pier on September 10th, with three more seen off Dana Point on the same day. Smaller numbers were also seen on pelagic trips on September 23rd and 25th. As if that wasn't enough, four Magnificent Frigatebirds were also observed flying north off Newport Pier ahead of the storm. To round out this month's pelagic wanderers, two Red-footed Boobies were observed offshore September 25th.

An adult Little Blue Heron, was found at Bolsa Chica Ecological Reserve on September 16th, and continued through the end of the month; it was joined by an immature bird on September 19th. A Cattle Egret was found at South Junior High School in Anaheim, September 23rd. A Zone-tailed Hawk was found at Serrano Creek Trail, September 4th-6th. Possibly the same bird was relocated at O'Neill Regional Park, September 14th.

**Purple Martins** were found migrating through several coastal hotspots, including San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary on September 2nd and 24th, at Thousand Steps Beach in

Laguna Beach, September 9th, and Harriett Wieder Regional Park, September 16th. **Bank Swallows** were found at sites across the county, including San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary, Bolsa Chica Ecological Reserve, and Newport Pier. **Plumbeous Vireos**, one of our more common "rare" fall migrants were found at Pepperwood Park in Irvine, September 16th, and at Harvard Community Park on September 30th.

The start of Fall's denouement can be said to begin with the trickling in of both common and vagrant wintering sparrows. A **Brewer's Sparrow** was found at Carbon Canyon Regional Park, September 18th, while closely-related **Clay-colored Sparrows** were found in Seal Beach on September 16th and Huntington Central Park on September 18th-19th. **Vesper Sparrows** were found at several locations, including Limestone Canyon, O'Neill Regional Park, Huntington Central Park, and Bolsa Chica Ecological Reserve, while **Green-tailed Towhees** were at both Fairview and Talbert Regional Parks. Both eastern oriole species made brief appearances in the county this month: an **Orchard Oriole** was found at Huntington Central Park, September 1st, while a **Baltimore Oriole** turned up at Huntington Central Park, September 24th.

September is one of our best months for vagrant eastern warblers, and this year did not disappoint. In addition to the continuing Northern Waterthrushes at Huntington Central Park, one was found at Gilman Park, September 12th, and in Arroyo Park, September 19th. Two different Tennessee Warblers were at Gilman Park beginning September 17th; others were found at a Yorba Linda residence, September 19th, and at Huntington Central Park from September 19th through the end of the month. A Lucy's Warbler was found at Mile Square Regional Park, September 27th, as was a Blackpoll Warbler on the 25th. Virginia's Warblers were at Huntington Central Park September 16th, Sycamore Park, September 25th-28th, and Gilman Park, September 28th. The most unusual warbler this fall was the Northern Parula at Carbon Canyon Regional Park, September 18th, followed closely by the Chestnut-sided Warblers at South Junior High, September 29th and at Gilman Park, September 30th. Rounding out the warblers were a pair of **American** Redstarts at Huntington Central Park, September 7th and Laguna Niguel, September 3rd. Last, but certainly not least, a Dickcissel at Huntington Central Park, September 23rd-26<sup>th</sup>, delighted birders from all over the county; a second bird visited a residence in South County on September 25th.

## Education News this November

#### **Summer Fun for Children**

Our summer camps were nearly back to normal this year after the 2-year impact due to Covid. We held 4 week-long sessions for different age groups: Beginner, Intermediate and 2 weeks of Advanced. Campers and parents gave us high praise: "Audubon Camp impacted me by inspiring me to become a better birder and be more aware about the nature around me." and "My son became much more aware and interested in birds in OC. He also made new friends and enjoyed the very knowledgeable teachers."

For all camps, children enjoyed a daily morning bird walk with a focus on nature journaling, what they noticed and what they wondered. They also learned bird identification techniques using field marks of color, shape, behaviors and sounds. They were eager to share their observations while we did our traditional tally. One Advanced Two camper wrote: "You learn how to ID birds, learn their sounds and get to sketch them!"

A big hit with the 7-12 year old campers was a research and art project about nests and eggs. Each chose a bird and researched its nesting habits, made eggs out of clay and went outside to find scattered materials to build the nest. We concluded with a presentation to other campers about what they learned. The shyest and quietest campers got a helping hand from the Camp Junior Naturalists. One child wrote: "I realized how hard it must be for a bird to build a nest."

Beginner's Camp week ended with a fascinating presentation with live raptors from the Orange County Bird of Prey Center. Intermediate Camp took a field trip to Bolsa Chica to witness first-hand the terns and shorebirds we had been learning about. What a thrill to see them fly right overhead on the footbridge, and to spot the tiny Snowy Plover with its chicks! And of course, the dancing Reddish Egret delighted all. One Coastal camp parent wrote: "Time outdoors with knowledgeable adults is invaluable."

For the two Advanced Camps, field trips to Crystal Cove State Park and Santiago Oaks Regional Park were a highlight. They brought to life the themes of Coastal Sage Scrub and Oak Woodland habitats, and importance of native plants. A presentation on Fire Ecology was eye-opening considering the wildfire situation in California. One camper wrote: "Audubon Camp is really fun and you get to learn a lot, not just about birds. You learn about plants and habitats, animals, and everything else in nature."

If you want your child to experience birds in a fun and positive way and to make friends with other young birders, then join us next summer! Enrollment opens in January and fills quickly, so check our newsletter or website for details.

## New Children's Meadow Walk Available Through November 5



#### Eastern Sierra trip – April 8/9 ® \$

This weekend trip will explore the Owens Valley where there is a wide variety of birds along with spectacular scenery. We will drive up 395 from Lone Pine to Bishop enjoying the magnificent Eastern Sierra scenery and birding along the way. We hope to see Tule Elk and will search for birds such as Bald and Golden Eagles, Red Crossbills, Black-billed Magpies, Pinyon Jays, Gray-crowned Rosy Finches, and 6 swallow species. On Sunday, we will reassemble early and drive to a Greater Sage-Grouse lek to watch the Sage-Grouse display. We will also bird Crowley Lake for the Sage Thrasher and Common Loon in breeding plumage. Depending on the road conditions, we may go NE over the nearby hills to spots for our picnic lunch and mountain birds such as Pinyon Jay, Cassin's Finch, Williamson's Sapsucker, White-headed Woodpecker & Black-backed Woodpecker. Group size is limited; advance reservations are necessary. Trip fee is \$40. Sign up through EventBrite. Directions & trip information will be provided to those with reservations.

Stay in the far right lane and immediately turn right onto Riparian View which will enter the San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary. The entrance road is marked by a green sign. If you miss the turn and reach Carlson, turn right and go around the block again to Harvard. The sanctuary is open every day from dawn until dusk.


