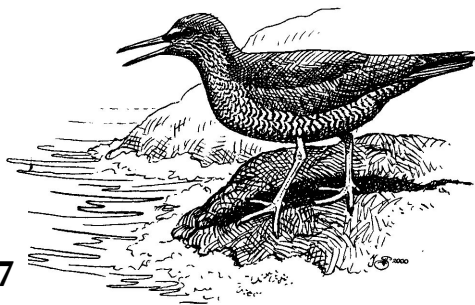

President - Jonathan Aguayo is a Senior Wildlife Biologist, currently our Vice President and Chair of the Programs Committee. He also participates in the DEI Committee and several Christmas Bird Counts.

“Peru Adventures: Andes to the Amazon”

Presented by Roy Poucher & Mark Singer

The country of Peru has the second highest bird list in the world, due to its proximity to the equator and, especially, due to its immense diversity of altitudes and habitats. In late October 2022, Roy Poucher, and his Bird Odyssey Tours company, took a group of seven Sea and Sage birders for a 3-week transect tour to explore this country, from the Pacific Ocean, high into the Andes and then deep into the Amazon rainforest. The Pacific coast is in the rain shadow of the Andes, creating some of the driest (yet still birdy) deserts in the world. The Andes are home to the sacred Inca ruins of Machu Picchu and many cities at and above 9,000'. At the peak of the Andes starts the famous Manu Road, descending eastward from 10,000' to 300' into Manu National Forest and the Amazonian rainforest jungle, the crown jewel of the earth's ecosystems. All of these habitats support unique bio-zones and birds. This program highlights these different bioregions, their culture, birds and other wildlife.

Roy Poucher started his birding career in 1991 with Sylvia Gallagher & leading her introductory class field trips. For the last 25 years, his company Bird Odyssey Tours has designed and conducted far-flung birding tours throughout the US and the world. Roy conducts aural birding workshops and aural field trips for the Morro Bay Bird Festival and for the Mono Basin Bird Chautauqua.

Mark Singer, a long-time member of Sea & Sage Audubon, has served on the S&SAS Board for many years. Though a world birder since 2010, Mark has concentrated on photographing Huntington Beach birds, photographing now over 200 species just within the city. Mark's photos from our Peru tour are one of the highlights of this program.

“Cutting Edge Research on Plastic Pollution”

presented by Captain Charles Moore and Executive Director, Shelly Moore, from the Algalita Foundation and the Moore Institute for Plastic Pollution Research

This month, Captain Moore returns for a second visit with Sea and Sage, teaming up with his Executive Director, Shelly Moore (no relation), to bring us up to date about their latest work with the State Water Resources Control Board to determine the amounts of plastic in drinking water. The Captain and Shelly are excited to present their cutting-edge plastic pollution research.

Sea and Sage looks forward to seeing Captain Moore again, to meeting Executive Director Shelly, and to the opportunity to learn more about plastic pollution research. We hope you will join us and look forward to seeing you!

Orange County Rarities

Several months of intensive winter birding (including four Christmas Bird Counts) means that most of the local vagrants visiting the county have already been discovered. Some birds continue part-way through the month before disappearing, while others persist until March, when they will depart for breeding territories. This is not to say that new vagrants can't be discovered in February, far from it! However, most of these new finds hail from underbirded (or never-birded) spots, or represent highly mobile species that might represent recent arrivals. Regardless, as days lengthen and temperatures rise, we will soon bid farewell to these winter visitors, as we welcome the first avian harbingers of spring in turn.

The wintering **Mexican Duck** at Carr Park was last observed February 20th. Wintering **Black Scoters** and **White-winged Scoters** continued in Huntington Beach through the first half of the month. Another white-winged scoter was seen off Dana Point, February 28th, as was a **Pink-footed Shearwater**, quite rare off our coast in winter. A flyby **Red-footed Booby** was seen off Newport Pier, February 10th. A **Solitary Sandpiper** at the Quail Hill ponds, February 20-21st, was likely an early spring migrant.

The **Lewis's Woodpecker** at Irvine Regional Park continued through the end of the month; a second bird was seen in Modjeska Canyon February 3rd. Continuing **Pacific-slope Flycatchers** were last seen at Chrisanta Drive on the 10th and at Gilman Park on the 28th. The **Hammond's Flycatcher** wintering at Rossmoor Park was last seen February 4th; a second bird was found at Gilman Park, February 23rd, and continued through the 27th. In last month's column I noted that no **Gray Flycatchers** were known to be wintering in the county, so naturally one decided to prove me wrong by turning up in the Villa Park Flood Control Basin, February 8th through the 15th.

The **Brown-crested Flycatcher** at Chrisanta Drive continued to be seen throughout the month, as did the **Tropical Kingbird** around Bolsa Chica Ecological Reserve. A **Scissor-tailed Flycatcher** was a shocking late winter discovery at Harriett Wieder Regional Park. The bird, which stuck around from February 17th-19th was only the second county record in at least the last ten years. The prevailing assumption at the time, was that this bird might spend most of its time at a nearby inaccessible golf course, but the short duration of observations suggests that this could have been a new arrival from elsewhere, not unexpected for this wandering species.

The Bolsa Chica **Verdin** was last relocated on February 4th, while the **Brown Creeper** overwintering at Huntington Central Park continued through the end of the month. **Sage Thrashers**, a locally early migrant species, were

found along Round Canyon February 1st-14th and in Rancho Santa Margarita February 9th. Both **Mountain Bluebirds** and **Townsend's Solitaires** continued to be reported from various spots within the county. A **Red Crossbill**, the only one reported in the county this winter, turned up in a Mission Viejo backyard on February 14th. This is a noteworthy find, considering that it's been a poor year for winter finches throughout most of the country.

Grasshopper Sparrows were found at their known breeding grounds in Bommer Canyon and Quail Hill Preserve at various points in February; both of these spots should be reliable for spotting these skulky birds when they begin establishing territories later this month. Wintering **Vesper Sparrows** continued through early February at Irvine Lake (February 5th), Irvine Regional Park (February 4th), and O'Neill Regional Park (February 8th). The county's only wintering **Clay-colored Sparrow** continued at Clark Regional Park through the end of the month. A number of **White-throated Sparrows** were observed in February; in addition to continuing birds, Irvine and Craig Regional Parks, at least three new individuals were found at Huntington Central Park, a residence in Orange, and a Costco in Irvine (more on the Costco later). A **Swamp Sparrow** at Esencia Sports Park near Ladera Ranch on February 11th was a noteworthy third record for the county this winter. The continuing **Green-tailed Towhee** was seen at Irvine Regional Park through the end of the month, while additional birds were at Talbert Nature Preserve February 18th and Overlook Park February 20th.

A **Scott's Oriole** was found in Trabuco Canyon February 1st. An overwintering **Orchard Oriole** in a Fountain Valley yard continued through February 2nd, while a second bird found at San Joaquin Wildlife sanctuary on the same day continued through the 8th. **Black-and-white Warblers** continued at Huntington Central Park and Aurora Park throughout the month, as did an **American Redstart** found at Laguna Niguel Regional Park February 23rd. A **Northern Parula** was refound at Del Obispo Park February 26th, while a **Palm Warbler** at Mason Regional Park February 20th-21st was new for the winter. A **Chestnut-sided Warbler** prompted a great deal of excitement when it was discovered by a Costco gas station in Irvine on February 15th. Kudos to the keen-eyed birder who discovered it; this serves as a good reminder that incredible birds can be found in the least likely of places, and that we should always keep our eyes peeled. The bird continued through the end of the month. Finally, a **Rose-breasted Grosbeak** continued at Huntington Central Park through the end of the month, while another bird proved a one-day wonder at Gilman Park February 26th.

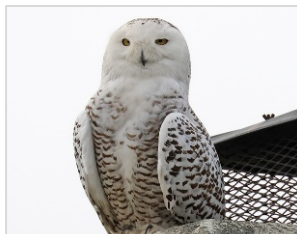
Coastal Camp for ages 11-12 from June 26-30.

Continue on Michelson (past the old entrance to the SJWS) to the 5th signal which is Harvard and turn right. Drive to University & turn right. Drive to Campus Drive & turn right. Stay in the far right lane and immediately turn right onto Riparian View which will enter the San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary. The entrance road is marked by a green sign. If you miss the turn and reach Carlson, turn right and go around the block again to Harvard. The sanctuary is open every day from dawn until dusk.
