
Marsh Education Project Annual Report 2022

"Audubon Camp inspired me to become a better birder and be more aware about nature around me."


Thanks to your support in 2022, our Education Team was able to re-connect people with nature after the pandemic. From interactive science programs for elementary school children to exciting night-time bat walks for adults, Sea and Sage Audubon created a safe environment for people to enjoy nature at the beautiful San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary. Our 52 adult naturalists and 7 teen volunteers donated over 3,500 hours to make these accomplishments happen. We thank everyone who helped us to share the important message of protecting birds and their habitat: donors, naturalists, coordinators, and the Irvine Ranch Water District.











• Nature Day Camps (58 children): Children and teens enjoyed 4 week-long, half-day camps at the marsh with daily nature walks, nature journaling, art projects, and more. Habitat themes for Advanced Bird Camps were coastal sage scrub and oak woodlands.
