"Diverting organic materials from Orange County landfills"

presented by David Tieu, a landfill manager for Orange County Waste & Recycling

Do you want to learn more about Orange County Waste & Recycling (OCWR)? Do you have questions regarding the organics law SB1383? To answer these questions, David Tieu will provide an overview of Orange County's landfill system and recently launched organics processing program to help support cities comply with SB 1383. David manages the central region of OCWR, which includes the Frank R. Bowerman Landfill. David is a registered Professional Civil Engineer and Certified Compost Operations ManagerTM. His areas of expertise include landfill management, environmental stewardship, and solid waste management.



We are looking forward to learning more about what happens to the stuff we throw away and we hope you will join us. Advance registration is required & will be available on our website under 'What's New' or 'Conservation'.

More information about Orange County Waste & Recycling (OCWR)

The disposal of organic materials in the landfill is a significant source of greenhouse gases. The organics law SB 1383 requires that organics, food scraps and yard waste be recycled rather than going to the landfill. The goal is a 75 percent reduction in organics going into landfills by 2025.

In response, OCWR has developed a three-phase plan for increasing recycling capacity. In phase 1, OCWR has opened a composting facility at each of the three landfills over the past year, thus diverting organic waste from the landfill and promoting the production of compost and mulch. The compost and mulch are available to the residents of Orange County. In Phase 2, OCWR is working with waste water treatment facilities to divert food waste and increase energy production. Phase 3 is for the future, when organic waste will be used to generate renewable energy via anaerobic digestion plants.



Recycling is not only important for reducing greenhouse emissions, but also for preserving our landfill capacity. "What we do today, will have a long effect, hundreds of years in the future" said David Tieu during a video interview entitled "OC Landfills: The Inside Story." As individuals, we can have a far-reaching impact by promoting a zero-waste strategy.

The Audubon Name

Based upon the unfavorable social connotations that have been revealed and are now associated with John James Audubon, Sea and Sage Board members and the DEI Committee (Diversity, Equity and Inclusion) are concerned with the recent decision by the National Audubon Society to continue to use the name "Audubon" in the title of the national organization. Each chapter must now decide whether to keep the name Audubon in their chapter name, or to drop it in favor of a new name. This is a national and regional conversation.

On May 9, the Sea and Sage Board established a committee, whose charge it is to lead the process of considering whether to change the name of Sea and Sage Audubon Society. You will be hearing more from this committee in the near future.

Bird Embroidery Classwith Sylvia Gallagher

Many people have enjoyed looking at Sylvia Gallagher's hand-embroidered birds--on quilts, pictures, and shirts--and wondered how she does it. For at least nine Saturday mornings, July 15 through Sept.16, 9:30 a.m. to 12:30 pm, she will teach a workshop, on how to do this sort of embroidery.

Participants will learn how to select a bird picture, transfer it to cloth, select embroidery floss colors, and do the stitches to bring the bird to life. The stitches involved are mostly her versions of satin stitch and long-and-short stitches which are quite different from those described in most embroidery books and websites.

Individualized instruction will allow the class to accommodate all levels of embroidery skill-beginner to expert--and all will find themselves learning new techniques. The cost for the class is \$100.00 for new students, \$60.00 for continuing students, who will need less assistance. This price includes a new illustrated document explaining in detail how to do the two main stitches.

Orange County Rarities by Samuel Bressler

Spring is upon us, and the birds know it. The overwintering vagrants have put in their last appearances and have embarked on their long journey north, while a select group of uncommon vagrants have put in appearances at some of the major migrant traps. This is the season to rejoice in the abundance of Wilson's Warblers, Ash-throated Flycatchers, Warbling Vireos, Lazuli Buntings and dozens of less common migrants, newly arrived after a long, cold winter. With the historic rain year bringing a flush of vegetation and high insect numbers, we hope that this northward trek foreshadows a successful breeding season.

White-winged Scoters were observed off
Huntington Beach through April 9th, while Black
Scoters were last observed off Huntington Beach
on April 16th and off Newport Beach through the
4th. A Long-tailed Duck was seen off Huntington
Beach April 2nd, as were a pair of Ancient
Murrelets. A Calliope Hummingbird visited
Moulton Meadows Park April 12th-15th. A Redthroated Loon that was found at SJWS April 26th
perished the next day.

April 14th-15th, Anaheim Coves Park April 18th, A Lewis's Woodpecker at Limestone Canyon April 19th was relatively late, while the long-staying Lewis's Woodpecker at Irvine Regional Park continued through at least the end of the month; at this point it will be interesting to see if this individual might decide to summer locally! The Brown-crested Flycatcher was last seen at the Chrisanta Drive Riparian Area April 11th. A Townsend's Solitaire was found at Oak Canyon Nature Center April 14th and continued through at least the 23rd, while other individuals continued at Huntington Central Park through the 6th and in the Blue Jay Campground area through the 20th.

Almost all the White-throated Sparrows had already departed the county before April, with the exceptions of individuals at Salt Creek Trail on the 4th and one at Tucker Wildlife Sanctuary last seen on the 8th. Swamp Sparrows continued at Huntington Central Park through the 17th and at Esencia Sports Park through the 16th; the latter location also hosted a Brewer's Sparrow on April 20th. A notable pulse of **Green-tailed Towhees** passed through the county in April, as they were found at several locations (including Coal and Fremont Canyons, Oak Canyon Nature Centers, Esencia Sports Park, and a private residence in Mission Viejo) where they were not known to have overwintered. A flock of 3-4 Yellow-headed Blackbirds were found at Seal Beach Naval Weapons Station April 13th and continued through 26th. The overwintering **Baltimore Oriole** at Mile Square RP continued through at least the 23rd.

Black-and-white Warblers continued at Eisenhower Park through April 11th, Aurora Park through April 23rd, and Huntington Central Park through April 24th. One observed at San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary may have been a spring migrant. A Lucy's Warbler was at Aldrich Park April 7th, while the **Tennessee Warbler** at Laguna Niguel Regional Park continued through the 20th. Laguna Niguel Regional Park also hosted an American Redstart through April 29th, as did Huntington Central Park. A **Northern Parula** at Del Obispo park continued through April 18th, while the Blackthroated Green Warbler at Estancia Park and Palm Warbler at Mason Regional Park continued through April 22nd and April 25th, respectively. A Bay-breasted Warbler that was found at Gum Grove Park April 8th was an excellent find. Somewhat uncharacteristically for most spring migrants, it lingered for two weeks, last being seen on the 22nd.


