

"Dark-eyed Juncos: Adaptations to the Urban Environment"

Presented by Ellie Diamant & Samuel Bressler

Ellie Diamant is a behavioral ecologist and evolutionary biologist interested in the interaction between human-caused environmental change and wildlife response, particularly birds in the built environment. She is currently a Zuckerman Postdoctoral Scholar at Ben Gurion University of the Negev. She explored how populations respond to multiple stressor interactions, with an emphasis on the pattern and process of behavioral and morphological adaptation in an urbanizing songbird, the dark-eyed junco

Samuel Bressler is a Biological Consultant with LSA Associates, Inc., specializing in the birds of Southern California. He received his Master's in biology in 2020 from UCLA, where he studied nesting behavior in dark-eyed juncos. He is also a long-time volunteer and former board member of Sea and Sage Audubon Society, and compiles the organization's Puente-Chino Hills Christmas Bird Count.

Dark-eyed Juncos are a model species to study urban adaptation and response in California. Together, Ellie Diamant and Samuel Bressler will discuss their 6 years of research into how juncos are being shaped by the urban environment, and the patterns and processes underlying their adaptation to the urban environment.

"Audubon Starr Ranch Sanctuary: A Southern California Treasure."

presented by Sandy DeSimone, Director of Research, Education and Land Management

Plants and birds are a passion for Sandy DeSimone, who did her doctoral research on coastal sage scrub, a globally endangered shrubland. After receiving her PhD, she took on the role of Director of Research, Education and Land Management at 4000- acre Audubon Starr Ranch Sanctuary in southeast Orange County.

Sandy's programs, both land management and education, are researchbased. Sandy initiated a series of experiments to test methods for controlling the highest priority upland nonnative on Starr Ranch artichoke thistle. After several years of research on biology and nonchemical control of artichoke thistle, the Starr Ranch field crew, comprised of a full -time field supervisor and four seasonal field assistants, started work. Since 1999 Starr Ranch has used an experimentally based method that has reduced artichoke thistle cover by 95% in a work site after one season of nonchemical treatment. Land managers from Ventura to San Diego Counties have visited Starr Ranch to hear about the research-based, sustainable land management practices and visit the restoration sites.

Local and regional partnerships that focus on Southern California conservation issues are also a critical aspect of Sandy's work and she works closely with academic and agency partners on tree pests, fire prevention, mountain lions, bird monitoring and rare riparian fish and macroinvertebrates.

Join us to learn about Starr Ranch's natural habitats and how they are being protected.

Conservation "Takes a Village"

Conservation work is not only daunting, but also an expanding and moving target. The more we learn about threats to birds and habitats, the more complicated it becomes to address the issues. Our committee was built on the early conservation work by people like Fern Zimmerman, Pete Bloom, Pete Desimone, Dan Silver, and many more, who worked (or are still working) to protect open spaces from the rapid urbanization and population growth at the turn of the century. Some battles, such as the successful efforts to protect Banning Ranch and to stop the extension of the Foothill Toll Road. continued beyond the turn of the century. It's not to say those battles were not complicated. Indeed, they were! But we now often find ourselves involved with additional issues, such as climate change, protecting already saved open spaces from development and birds in smaller and sometimes urbanized habitats. dealing with plastic waste, and working at local and statewide levels to help curb the use of rodenticides and other poisons that threaten birds and habitats.

To help us work more effectively, we are fortunate to have 3 active Conservation Subcommittees, which would welcome new members:

Legislation & Advocacy, a team led by Vic Leipzig, is tracking conservation legislation and making connections with our local and state elected officials. Tackling Climate and Trash, led by Melissa Rapp and Chris Byrd, focuses on perhaps the most serious long-term threats to birds - mounting plastic trash and climate change. This team is helping us understand how to do our part to address the overwhelming issues of reducing carbon emissions and the tangible steps we can take to reduce single use plastics. The Coastal Commission Issues Subcommittee, led by Scott Thomas and Catherine Steinberg, is expanding our efforts to protect coastal resources with a connection to the California Coastal Act, including the Western Snowy Plover, California Least Tern, and other

sensitive species along the southern California Coast.

These expansions are only possible with the continued assistance from many able and dedicated volunteers, support from the chapter and our Board, and through the leadership of Susan Sheakley, Conservation Committee Chair. - Scott Thomas, Conservation Committee Vice Chair

Accessible Birding and Lunch – Bolsa Chica, Thursday, January 11th, 2:00pm

Sea and Sage Audubon is sponsoring an accessible "Birding and Snack" event at Bolsa Chica Ecological Reserve in Huntington Beach on Thursday, January11th at 2pm. This event is designed for our members who require an easy. accessible, slow paced bird walk. Note the starting time is later than usual to coincide with a very low tide for best viewing. Bolsa Chica is one of the premier birding locations in southern California, and in the winter features a wide variety of waterbirds. We will start birding from the inner bay footbridge, which goes over water and mudflats, and is adjacent to the Reserve's south parking lot. The bridge is flat and long. providing ample area for viewing over the inner Bolsa Bay. From the bridge, those who want to walk will continue on a wide hardpacked trail less than 0.2 miles to view additional bird colonies at the full tidal basin, which connects to the ocean. Afterward, we will enjoy a snack together and discuss the various species we observed. There is no cost or parking fee for this event, but reservations are required. Sea and Sage Audubon LEARNING CALIFORNIA BIRD SOUNDS (LCBS)

An Intermediate-Level Birding Skills Workshop
Presented by Sylvia Gallagher, with Doug Lithgow and Roy Poucher

Accomplished birders depend on their ears much more than their eyes for detecting and identifying many types of birds, especially when they are in wooded or brushy habitats. They walk along listening and only try to see the bird if they are uncertain about the identification of a vocalization they hear. Usually more than 90% of the birds they find are identified first by the sounds they make. If you are still bird-*watching* most of the time, here's a chance to start bird-*listening*. A Birding Skills Workshop, sponsored by Sea and Sage Audubon and presented via Zoom by a team chaired by Sylvia Gallagher, will serve as an introduction to **LEARNING CALIFORNIA BIRD SOUNDS (LCBS)**. We'll cover around 60 common species of the California lowlands west of the mountains that are most frequently detected first by voice. In addition, there will be a short lecture each week on the nature and meaning of bird sounds.

If you have a fairly good knowledge of the appearance of the common birds, you should be well prepared for this ten-week workshop. (The ten-week Sea and Sage Introductory Birding Skills Workshop is the level of experience presumed for this one.) Those who have done LCBS before are welcome to repeat it as many times as they wish.

Five sections will be offered, but be aware that there is a possibility that one or more of them will be canceled if enrollment is insufficient. Be sure to list as many choices as you can. The dates (including holidays) and times are as follows:

Mon. evenings, 7:00 - *ca.* 10:00 p.m., Jan. 8 - Mar. 11. Tues. mornings, 9:00 - *ca.* 12:00 a.m., Jan. 9 - Mar. 12.

Wed. evenings, 7:00 - ca. 10:00 p.m., Jan. 10 - Mar. 13.

Thurs. mornings, 9:00 a.m. - ca. noon, Jan. 11 - Mar. 14.

Thurs. evenings, 7:00 - ca. 10:00 p.m., Jan. 11 - Mar. 14.

The workshop will be accompanied by MANY field trips, led by current and former workshop members who are experienced aural birders. We'll try to have a couple scheduled every week, some on weekends, some on adjacent weekdays. In order to get full benefit from this workshop, plan to spend at least three hours every week listening to birds in the field in a variety of locations: the trips are designed to help you do this.

The maximum enrollment for each section is 22. If any section does not have at least 12 people enrolled by Dec. 26, it will be canceled. Reserve early, though, because some sections will fill rapidly. A donation of \$180.00 or more is requested, if you can afford it. (Send check, made out to Sea and Sage Audubon Society, with your enrollment form.)

The required "textbook" for the workshop is Sylvia's **Learning California Bird Sounds** (**4th ed.**, 2016, available at Audubon House, a package containing worksheets and a flash drive with introductory and practice sounds (\$39.00). **Older editions will not be acceptable.** (If you last did the workshop in Jan. - Mar., 2016, and only have the preliminary version of the workshop package used then, you must purchase the final version. It became available in summer, 2016; you may have purchased it then.) If two people in the same household plan to share the sounds, each one must have a copy of the worksheets. Make your own copies of the ones that come in the package. You must buy the required workshop package far enough ahead of the first session that you will have time to do a little homework before the first meeting. This will be outlined in your confirmation letter.

A highly recommended book is the **Peterson Field Guide to Bird Sounds of Western North America** by Nathan Pieplow. Brand new copies will be on sale at Audubon House for only \$10.00 from Nov. 1 - Jan. 10. Get it while supplies last.

Your workshop experience will be *greatly* enhanced if you install **Raven Lite** sonogram-making software in your computer--and you must have a computer (PC or Mac) in order to use the flashdrive. This free service from the Cornell University Lab. of Ornithology is available on-line from **RavenSoundSoftware.com**. In fact, **you will be** *seriously* **handicapped if you try to do the workshop without Raven Lite!** If you already have an older version, you must upgrade it to the current Raven Lite 2.0.4. For problems with installation, contact Doug Lithgow (dmlithgow@aol.com). We are working on revised instructions for using the new Raven Lite 2.0.4. The instructions that Cornell provides are not easy to understand.

Western Snowy Plover/CA Least Tern Survey

Education News by Trude Hurd, Project Director of Education

Overheard recently at the San Joaquin marsh:

- "I can learn and have fun at the same time."
- "It's okay that we're missing recess; this is fun."
- When asked if they were ready to leave and go to the bus, the students shouted "NO, we want more!"

Quotes like these make me smile to know that children are benefiting from our programs. In 2023-4, 4th and 5th grade students in 45 Santa Ana classes will experience Outdoor Adventures science discovery program. To accomplish this outreach, we rely on 2 things: volunteer naturalists and donations.

For three months, new volunteers have cheerfully attended my 7 training classes where they learned the basics of the three activities during Outdoor Adventures: Bird Walk, Pond Study, and Bird Beak Adaptations. They learned how to use interpretive techniques to make the lessons interesting and interactive plus how to teach children to look effectively through binoculars and microscopes.

These eleven **New Naturalists** are now moving on to the next phase which is to observe actual tours and practice teaching. One important aspect of Outdoor Adventures is assisting children with **Reading and Science Literacy.** We give each student a copy of our 28-page *Birds of SJWS* field guide plus three issues of *Audubon Adventures*, National Audubon's nature newsletters for children.

Orange County Rarities by Samuel Bressler

October is a paradoxical month, in that most of our common migrants have already departed for the south, yet in many ways it's the best time of the year to encounter eastern vagrants, especially for those who can diligently sort through the massive flocks of newly-arrived Yellow-rumped Warblers and White-crowned Sparrows. Most of these vagrants only stay with us for a few days or weeks before disappearing, but some may choose to winter in our well-planted parks and gardens.

A Pacific Golden-plover was at Bolsa Chica Ecological Reserve from the 26th-29th, while a Pectoral Sandpiper was observed on the 22nd. A continuing Pectoral Sandpiper at San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary was last seen on the 17th. A Masked **Booby** was brought in from an offshore vessel early in the month, while a **Nazca Booby** was seen on an offshore pelagic trip on the 8th. Also seen on the same trip were at least three Common Terns and a Sabine's Gull. These latter species were also encountered at Bolsa Chica on the 6th and offshore on the 8th, respectively. A Little Blue Heron first seen on the 24th continued through the end of the month, while a total of eight Western Cattle Egrets observed there on the 11th was a remarkable high count for anywhere in the county. Cattle Egrets have been widely reported across the county this month. with up to three reported at San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary through the 25th, and an inland record at Anaheim Coves Park on the 25th.

Up to three **Ferruginous Hawks** were seen in the county, with one at Arbor Park in Los Alamitos observed from the 4th through the 26th, and a potentially separate individual observed at Seal Beach Naval Weapons Station Seal Beach on the 25th. While both of these hotspots provide some of the best remaining open space for this species along the coastal slope, one observed flying over a Fullerton neighborhood was almost certainly just a migrant. Other notable migrant raptors included a single **Swainson's Hawk** at Jeronimo Open Space Park on the 6th, as well as 5 individuals seen over Fullerton October 16th and over Arevalos Park on the 18th; it's possible that these latter two observations might pertain to the same kettle.

Yellow-bellied Sapsuckers were at Gibbs Park in Huntington Beach, October 23rd-25th, and at Harvard Community Park on the 31st. A Tropical Kingbird continued at Harriett Wieder Regional Park through the 13th, while new birds were observed at San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary October 4th-21st, and at Craig Regional Park October 14th-15th. Gibbs Park also produced a one-day wonder Varied Thrush on October 26th, an unusually coastal location for this species outside of irruption years. A first-county Wood Thrush was a remarkable find at Irvine Regional Park, where this normally reclusive species proved highly cooperative for the hundreds of birders who visited it from October 16th-23rd.

The latter half of fall delivered a surprising dearth of vagrant sparrows; the most notable of these were a large number of **Vesper Sparrows** across the county, a **Swamp Sparrow** at Canyon Park, October 28th, **Yellow-headed Blackbirds** were at San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary on the 14th, the Randall Preserve (formerly Banning Ranch) on the 22nd, and the Seal Beach Naval Weapons Station on the 24th. The **Orchard Oriole** continuing in residential Fountain Valley continued through the 23rd, while a second individual was observed at nearby Mile Square Regional Park on the 22nd; Mile Square also hosted a pair of continuing **Baltimore Orioles** through the end of the month.

As usual, October brought a large number of eastern warblers to the county, with the most notable being a Painted Redstart at Canvon Park in Costa Mesa. first seen on the 12th and continuing through the end of the month, a Chestnut-sided Warbler at Mesa Verde Park, October 25th-28th, and a Blackburnian Warbler at Mile Square Regional Park, October 15th. Other, less unexpected warblers, included Blackpoll Warblers at Gilman Park through the 7th, and at Laguna Lake Park on the 18th, Lucy's Warbler at Hiltscher Park, October 11th-13th, and a handful of Black-and-white. Tennessee, and Palm Warblers scattered across the county. A highly sought-after Dickcissel was seen at O'Neill Regional Park. October 14th-15th, while a second individual was detected on the 25th.

Continue on Michelson (past the old entrance to the SJWS) to the 5th signal which is Harvard and turn right. Drive to University & turn right. Drive to Campus Drive & turn right. Stay in the far right lane and immediately turn right onto Riparian View which will enter the San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary. The entrance road is marked by a large sign. If you miss the turn and reach Carlson, turn right and go around the block again to Harvard. The sanctuary is open every day from dawn until dusk.
