

Western Snowy Plover & California Least Tern OC Quarterly Survey: If you have already attended a Snowy Plover Survey training session, join us in looking for Snowy Plovers, Least Terns, and their habitats on our local beaches, while helping to contribute to endangered species research. 2024 FERN ZIMMERMAN CONSERVATION AWARD AND LETTERS OF COMMENDATION

Each year since 1967 the Conservation Committee has presented the Conservation Award and Letters of Commendation to individuals or organizations that have made noteworthy contributions to the protection of habitats, natural resources, birds or wildlife in Orange County. This year at the Annual Dinner on Friday, March 15, it will be our honor to present the following:

Fern Zimmerman Conservation Award

* Melissa Borde: for her many contributions to the protection of the Bolsa Chica Reserve with a particular emphasis on the implementation of the Bolsa Chica Reserve Watch Program. As the Reserve Manager and Environmental Scientist at Bolsa Chica Ecological Reserve, Melissa manages one of the largest and last remaining coastal wetlands in Southern California. She oversees daily operations, infrastructure maintenance, biological monitoring and surveying of threatened and endangered species, and other tasks. To also bring together the three Bolsa Chica non-profit groups, along with Sea and Sage Audubon, to create the Watch Program, a collaborative, volunteer effort to help nearly 100,000

annual visitors better understand and respect the reserve, is a great achievement for conservation.

Letters Of Commendation

With recognition that window strikes take a heavy toll on birds, Sea and Sage commends two forwardthinking institutions that recently took steps to make their buildings more bird friendly.

- * Orange County Parks, Nix Nature Center: for protecting birds from window strikes. The Nix Center installed bird deterrent film with rows of barely visible dots on large windows that were having repeated bird strikes. Birds do not recognize glass as a solid object and when it reflects habitats, it tricks them into flying into the glass and often dying. Researchers estimate that up to 1 billion birds die every year in the United States alone from colliding with glass. The dots are hardly noticeable to human visitors, but are real lifesavers to the avian visitors!
- * Huntington Beach Central Library and Supporters: for protecting birds by adding strike deterrents to their windows. After being alerted by visitors and area residents that hummingbirds were dying in large numbers after striking the library's massive windows, the library applied bird deterrent film over selected problem windows. The costs of the treatment were covered by an anonymous donation for the materials and the challenging installation job. Since installation, the library has received no reports of dead birds.

WHO IS FERN ZIMMERMAN?



Fern Zimmerman was a true conservationist, grass roots organizer, birdwatcher, and chapter leader who contributed much to the development of Sea and Sage Audubon Society. Fern provided a constant source of optimism about

our ability to effect change in our environment and helped us find our voice in advocacy. Fern received the SAS Conservation Award in 1973. She continued as a conservation activist for 23 more years. After her death in 1996, Sea and Sage named its conservation award in her honor.

Orange County Rarities by Samuel Bressler

It's the middle of winter, and it would seem that most vagrants would have been comfortably settled into their local haunts. And yet, many birds found earlier in the winter are now gone, and are replaced by new, previously unreported individuals. This is partly due to observer effort: where and when birds are found depends on when and where birders are looking for them. But birds have wings, and may be driven elsewhere by weather, disturbance, or perhaps general restlessness. The more birders who keep tabs on existing rarities and find vagrants in under birded areas, the better our understanding of such mid-winter movement will become.

Black Scoters and White-winged Scoters continued off Huntington Beach; these pelagic ducks were joined by a Long-tailed Duck at Huntington Beach Pier, which was first found on January 13th and continued through the end of the month. An American Oystercatcher continued in Dana Point through at least January 14th; likely the same bird was refound at Crescent Bay Point Park on the 17th. **Neotropic Cormorants** continued in their reliable locations, but new records at Craig Regional Park and Tustin Ranch Golf Course on January 9th provide evidence of their continued spread across the county. Ancient Murrelets have irrupted across much of North America this winter, so one in Dana Point Harbor from January 28th-31st was perhaps overdue. The Little Blue Heron at Bolsa Chica Ecological Reserve continued through the end of the month, as did the **Zone-tailed Hawk** at Serrano Creek Park. A Zone-tailed at Santiago Oaks Regional Park on January 9th was presumably a second individual; likely the same bird was seen along the Upper Santa Ana River on the 28th. The continuing Prairie Falcon at the Great Park was last seen on January 7th.

The Yellow-bellied Sapsucker at Harvard Community Park continued through at least January 30th as did the Williamson's Sapsucker at Los Pinos Probation Camp. Gray Flycatchers continued at Huntington Central Park through Jan. 17th and at Riverdale Park through at least Jan. 30th, while at least a half dozen Western Flycatchers were also found or relocated in January. A Tropical Kingbird continued at Bolsa Chica through the end of the month, though it almost exclusively frequented the restricted area. At least five Plumbeous Vireos continued in January, exclusively in central and south county, while a Sage Thrasher at Huntington Central Park was last seen on January 8th.

Easily the most impressive passerine found in the county this month, a **White Wagtail** first found on January 28th continued through the end of the month; this is one of very few records for this Siberian songbird in the county.

January boasted relatively few sparrows, at least compared to the veritable cornucopia present earlier this winter. Highlights included continuing Claycolored Sparrow at Fairview Regional Park through January 6th, Green-tailed Towhees at Irvine Regional Park, January 7th and Overlook Park, January 29th, and a scattering of White-throated and Vesper Sparrows across central county.

The returning **Orchard Oriole** in Fountain Valley continued through January 6th, while an out-ofseason, out-of-place Hooded Oriole was found in a neighborhood in Silverado on New Years Day and continued through the end of the month. The most notable overwintering warblers in the county were the continuing Black-throated Green Warbler at Chrisanta Drive (through January 23rd), the Northern Parula at Huntington Central Park (through January 16th), a new Chestnut-sided Warbler (from January 9th through the end of the month), and a Grace's Warbler in a residential area in Aliso Viejo (not chaseable). Other warblers included an American Redstart which continued through January 31st, a Tennessee Warbler at El Niguel Golf Course, and several Black-and-white Warblers throughout the county. The **Hepatic Tanager** and Rose-breasted Grosbeak at Serrano Creek Park were last seen on the 21st and 23rd respectively.

Accessible Birding and Lunch at the San Joaquin Marsh - Friday, April 19, at 9:00 am

Sea & Sage is sponsoring an accessible birding event at the San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary (SJWS) on Friday. April 19th, at 9:00 am. This is a slow walk on flat, hardpacked paths. The SJWS is a 300-acre freshwater wetland comprised of multiple ponds, some of which have islands for nesting birds. Over 200 bird species visit the Marsh annually. Join us for some excellent birding, a discussion of the history of the Wildlife Sanctuary, and a bring-your-own lunch. There are shaded picnic tables, a restroom with a handicapped stall, and a nature center inside Audubon House with a library, gift shop and taxidermy specimens. This will be our last accessible event before the summer break. There is no cost or parking fee for this event, but reservations are required. Park & Plano Trabuco; Lion Country & Areas south of the 405 (The area between Lake Forest & El Toro from Trabuco Rd. to Glen Ranch Rd, excluding Oso Reservoir); Mission Viejo-Lake Forest-El Toro & foothills; former El Toro Marine Base & foothill areas; Rattlesnake & Siphon Reservoirs; Peters Canyon Reg. Park & Lemon Heights. The Total Species for this count was 156. The number of participants was 98.


