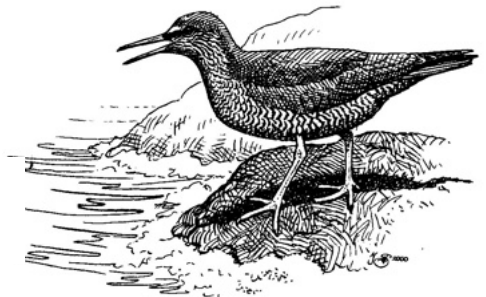

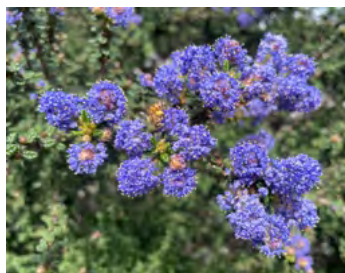

**"Mountain Chickadee Breeding
Ecology in the Northern Sierra Nevada"**
presented by Lauren E. Whitenack

The Sierra Nevada is a snow-driven ecosystem where the amount and duration of winter precipitation affects the flora and fauna year-round. Animals living at high elevations not only experience harsher overwintering conditions but also experience shorter summer breeding seasons. Food availability during the summer is directly related to winter conditions - winter snowpack holds the year's supply of water, and the abundance of primary prey items (such as insects) is affected by their rate of overwinter survival. Mountain chickadees are perhaps the avian emblem of the Sierra Nevada. They are one of the most abundant bird species throughout the year, and monitoring their populations can help us understand how the Sierra Nevada ecosystem is responding to climate change.

Lauren Whitenack is a PhD student at the University of Nevada, Reno, studying Mountain Chickadees in the northern Sierra Nevada mountains. She investigates the relationships between climate, insect abundance, and bird reproduction, as insects are the main food source for many birds during the breeding season. Come learn what she has discovered over the last 2 years of insect sampling and monitoring Mountain Chickadees in nest boxes!

BROWN PELICAN CRISIS

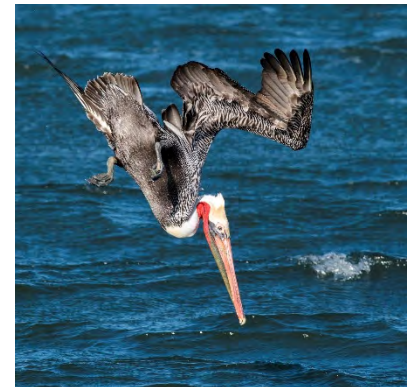
Pelicans in Crisis: In the last few months high numbers of California Brown Pelicans have been arriving at southern California rehabilitation facilities in an emaciated condition and seemingly starving.

Although their main prey items seem abundant, scientists speculate that warmer ocean waters may be driving forage fish into deeper waters, making it hard for pelicans to reach their prey.

According to both the Wetlands and Wildlife Care Center (WWCC) in Huntington Beach and the International Bird Rescue (IBR) center in San Pedro, saving and rehabilitating the starving pelicans is expensive and labor-intensive. As of this writing, WWCC has processed 89 pelicans; IBR has received over 230 starving pelicans this spring and believes many more will come.

A guided marsh walk begins at 6:00pm that will take in the sights and sounds of evening marsh life. At 7:00pm, the program will start with a drawing to thank participants for bringing their own place settings. Then we will introduce our 2024 Bloom-Hays Award recipients, followed by door prizes at 7:30pm. We will not be hosting a speaker this year, in order to avoid the mosquitoes that arrived last year, as we were waiting for dark, in order to use the big screen. 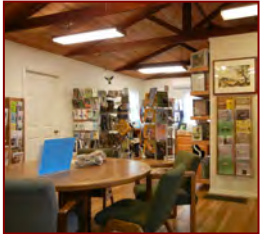

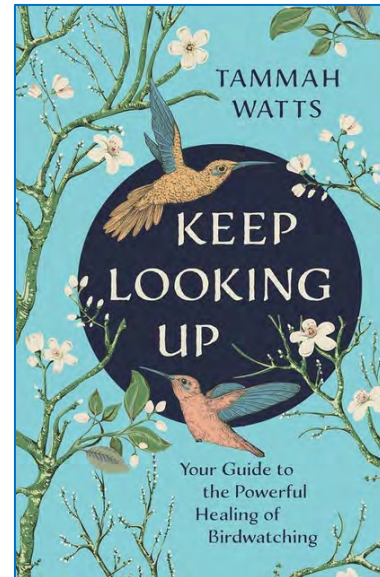

Your Guide to the Powerful Healing of Birdwatching

A BIRDING JOURNEY AT HOME AND BEYOND
It began with a flutter of yellow feathers flitting through the trees, casting beams of sunshine and promise that burst through her kitchen window. This was her sign to look up. As a licensed therapist, Watts knew that she needed to seek and accept hope, love, and support to overcome her chronic pain and cultivate resilience. But she could not predict that the little yellow bird would put her on the path to healing by fostering a powerful connection with birds and the experience of birding.

Right outside your door, flies just what you've been looking for to help ease symptoms of stress, pain, depression, and anxiety. All you have to do is look up, take notice, and open your heart and mind. No matter where you are, what you look like, or what you're going through, you can create sacred space and connection with birds, and begin to heal.

Welcome to our New Naturalists

Do you think that in the future we will have a well-informed population that can make unbiased decisions to help the environment? To make this happen, you can do something right now. You can help school children develop a basic understanding of science and ways they can protect nature and birds. You can volunteer to become an Outdoor Adventures naturalist or you can donate money for bus transportation to bring students to the marsh for this outstanding program. Keep reading to learn how!

It is not true that you need to be a bird expert or have a scientific degree to be an Outdoor Adventures naturalist. All we ask is that you have a strong desire to share nature with elementary school children, a willingness to learn specific techniques about how to effectively share nature at the marsh, and a commitment to volunteering for only 2 tour mornings a month from October through May.

In 2023-24, eleven volunteers completed the Outdoor Adventures training. Their background is as varied as the birds we encounter at the marsh. Some are former teachers of high school Spanish, fifth grade in the Santa Ana school district, Advanced Placement English, and special education. One was an environmental regulatory specialist with Boeing while another is just starting a career in childhood education or environmental studies. A few are new to the area while others already volunteer with Sea and Sage projects like Audubon House, bird census, Bat Walks, and Nature Day camps. Each one is unique and well capable of sharing their love of nature.

During Project Director Trude Hurd's training classes, they learned how to ask engaging questions, how to teach children to effectively use binoculars and microscopes, and how to identify common birds and macro-invertebrates encountered during the tours. The new naturalists showed kindness, curiosity, and patience as they worked together as a team. We are proud to add these eleven new volunteers to our Outdoor Adventure naturalist program!

Grateful for Donations for School Bus Trips

This spring, ten people with generous hearts donated a total of \$8,850 to bring Santa Ana school children to the marsh for our science program. For many of the children, this is their first field trip, first time on a bus, first time using binoculars & microscopes, and first time seeing birds in a natural habitat. Outdoor Adventures helps increase the Santa Ana students knowledge about wetlands and how to protect birds, and has an even bigger impact on some individuals.

One Santa Ana teacher wrote: "One of our female students was so inspired that she built a birdhouse with her dad. She was excited to be able to see the different types of birds through the binoculars and recognized some of them through her research. She wants to be an astronaut and loves science. I overheard her explaining to another student about the food web and how important it is not to litter."

Orange County Rarities

April brings hordes of warblers, vireos, flycatchers, and other neotropical migrants, arriving in fresh plumage and peak condition from their southern wintering grounds. Diligent searching can result in the occasional eastern vagrant amongst the flocks of Wilson's Warblers, Warbling Vireos, and Western Flycatchers, but they are perhaps harder to find than in May or June. Overall there are fewer vagrants now than in fall migration, likely because there are no freshly fledged juveniles that have not honed their navigational skills, and there is greater evolutionary pressure on migration towards the breeding grounds than during fall, because the former individual is less likely to successfully find a mate and reproduce.

Calliope Hummingbirds are scarce spring migrants in our coastal lowlands. Last month at least three were found, one at Sea Terrace Community Park April 9th, and two at Crown Valley Community Park; an adult male on April 14th and an immature male, April 16th-22nd. The long-staying South County **American Oystercatcher** was last seen at Salt



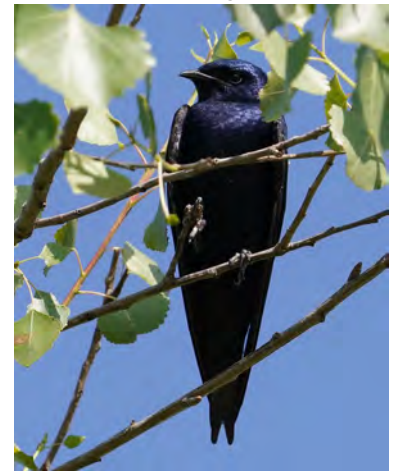
Creek Beach on April 30th, while a **Solitary Sandpiper** was found at Fairview Park the same day. The latter species is a more regular vagrant in

fall in the county, but quite a rare visitor in spring. A **Franklin's Gull** found at Bolsa Chica Ecological Reserve, April 25th, continued through the end of the month, while a **Western Cattle Egret** was found at Seal Beach Naval Weapons Station, April 17th.

Gray Flycatchers were at San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary on April 12th and Chrisanta Drive Riparian Corridor on the 27th. Over a dozen Plumbeous Vireos were found throughout the county in April, a continuation of an incursion that

was first observed in late winter. A significantly rarer **Yellow-throated Vireo** was found at North Lake in Irvine April 16th; it continued through the 17th; this is a much rarer eastern vagrant that is not observed every year. A **Purple Martin** was photographed at Little Cottonwood Park in Los Alamitos on April 14th.

Yellow-headed Blackbirds were seen at the Orange County Great Park on April 18th, Seal Beach Naval Weapons Station on April 29th, and



Anaheim Coves Park on April 30th. A **Baltimore Oriole** continued at Emery Park in Fullerton through April 11th, while another bird was seen at Laguna Lake Park on April 6th. **Green-tailed Towhees** at Irvine Regional Park on April 24th and Harriett Wieder Regional Park on April 29th may have been continuing overwintering individuals while a presumed migrant was found at Huntington Central Park on April 24th.

A **Tennessee Warbler** continued at El Niguel Golf Course through April 26th, while the **Chestnut-sided Warbler** at North Lake was last seen on April 9th. The continuing **American Restart** and **Black-and-white Warblers** at Huntington Central Park were last seen April 22nd and April 11th respectively, while the overwintering **Black-and-white Warbler** at Irvine Regional was last seen on April 6th. A **Palm Warbler** at Anaheim Coves Park on April 21st was a likely spring migrant.

From the San Diego Fwy (405): Exit on Jamboree, south toward Newport Beach. At the 1st signal, Michelson, turn left. Continue on Michelson (past the old entrance to the SJWS) to the 5th signal which is Harvard and turn right. Drive to University & turn right. Drive to Campus Drive & turn right. Stay in the far right lane and immediately turn right onto Riparian View which will enter the San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary. The entrance road is marked by a large sign. If you miss the turn and reach Carlson, turn right and go around the block again to Harvard. The sanctuary is open every day from dawn until dusk.
