"How to Add 'Albatross Counter' to your Resume" presented by Dan Cullinane



All three species of albatross that breed in the Northern Hemisphere have made a comeback on Midway Atoll. Midway Atoll, famous for the Battle of Midway that was the turning point of World War II in the Pacific, is now a Fish and Wildlife Refuge. Come learn how the annual albatross count on Midway Atoll is conducted, and how a small group of volunteers can count two million albatross in a mere three weeks time! See what other bird life can be experienced there and how you can become a volunteer counter on the largest albatross colony in the world.

Dan Cullinane is a retired high school science teacher and currently one of the Albatross Count Leaders on Midway Atoll. He is a longtime volunteer for Sea and Sage Audubon working as a Tree Swallow Monitor besides performing all the maintenance on the Tree Swallow boxes at San Joaquin Marsh. He also helps with the quarterly Western Snowy Plover Census along the coast.

"The Irvine-Laguna Wildlife Corridor; Preserving the South Coast Wilderness

presented by Norm Grossman, President of Laguna Greenbelt

The South Coast Wilderness is 22,000 acres of protected open space involving portions of the cities of Aliso Viejo, Irvine, Laguna Beach, Laguna Woods, Newport Beach, the County of Orange County, and the State of California. These 22,000 acres were acquired due to the efforts of citizens who understood the importance of preserving nature.



The South Coast Wilderness environment faces a potential catastrophic threat to the native wildlife. The 22,000 acres is not large enough to guarantee the genetic diversity necessary to maintain healthy populations, particularly under the increasing stress of a changing climate. This threat was identified almost 20 years ago by biologists who realized that the only practical long-term solution was to create a wildlife corridor between the South Coast Wilderness and the Cleveland National Forest. This became the basis of the six-mile-long Irvine-Laguna Wildlife Corridor (ILWC).

Norm Grossman, President of the Laguna Greenbelt, will present a brief history on the creation of the South Coast Wilderness and the challenges faced in maintaining wildlife resiliency. He will describe how the concept of the ILWC was developed as the first totally urban wildlife corridor in the country and discuss the project's current status.

Shrinking the Summer BBQ's Carbon Footprint

The Tackling Climate and Trash (TCT) Conservation subcommittee thanks all of those who volunteered, brought their own reusable tableware, or used the scrape and rinse station at the BBQ. A special thanks to Gail Richards, the organizer of the BBQ, who supported our goals to reduce use of single- use items at our events and promote eco-friendly alternatives.

The TCT subcommittee focuses on what we can do as individuals and as an organization to reduce trash and combat climate change. By using reusable place settings, the Sea and Sage BBQ reduced trash and fossil fuel use in producing and shipping single-use plastics. We were able to keep plates, glasses, napkins, and cutlery for 200 diners from going to a landfill. Instead of purchasing plastic tablecloths, Gail acquired beautiful hand-sewn bird tablecloths that can be reused repeatedly. Organics and recyclable items were separated at a scrape and rinse station and sent for recycling. The packaging and donation of leftovers minimized food waste.

TCT also sought to educate on ways to reduce single-use household items. The laundry strips given as Welcome Gifts are a great introduction to reducing the use of single-use plastic jugs. The Door Prizes included alternatives to single-use paper towels, plastic sponges and plastic vegetable bags. With the support of Tree of Life Nursery, native plants and a gift card were at the Display Table. Native plants in many ways are the perfect sustainable plant, and blooming plants were on each dining table.

Thank you to the TCT subcommittee members: Susan Sheakley, Scott Thomas, Chris Byrd, Sudha Warrier, Kate Grabenstein, and Melissa Rapp. They coordinated the scrape and rinse process, carefully selected Welcome Gifts and Door Prizes, and even took home Sea and Sage place settings and tablecloths to wash.

Using single-use items may seem labor intensive, but if each of us tries to minimize our use of single-use items, together we can make a difference. As individuals and collectively, we can have a significant role in reducing our carbon footprint and easing the burden on our planet.

The TCT subcommittee meets monthly on the third Thursday of the month. If you are interested is joining us and helping to shape our projects, activities and research, please talk to Susan Sheakley or any of the individuals mentioned above.

Join our Outdoor Adventures Naturalists and Share Nature with School Children

For over three decades, Sea and Sage Audubon has helped school children develop a basic understanding of science and specific ways that they can protect nature and birds. Through our Outdoor Adventures science discovery program, 4-5th graders learn how to be responsible for the environment while surrounded by the beauty of a freshwater wetland. To offer this program, we rely on about thirty volunteer naturalists. If you are looking for a rewarding place to volunteer, then consider joining our Outdoor Adventures team!

You don't need to be a birding expert or have a science degree because you will learn program basics through our thorough training classes and newly updated training manual. All backgrounds are welcome from retired school teachers, engineers, camp parents, and more. What you do need is patience with children, a willingness to learn, and commitment of only 2 Tuesday or Thursday mornings a month (October through May) after you graduate.

Experience comes with practice, and you will have plenty of time to practice. Through 7 training classes and 8 rehearsal sessions, you will learn how to ask engaging questions and understand how to easily share the 3 activities. You will also make new friends and become more familiar with freshwater wetlands.

Naturalists work hard during the 2½ hour program as we rotate between an hour Bird Walk around the marsh, half-hour Pond Study activity in the lab, and half-hour Bird Adaptations lesson with taxidermy specimens. We also have fun. We see joy on children's faces as they use binoculars and microscopes for the first time. Their faces light up when seeing a Great Blue Heron walking on the path right in front of them. They get excited when hearing that they can return to the marsh with their families for free. Best of all is knowing that what we do as

naturalists is changing lives. According to a Santa Ana teacher, "this program exposes our students to a real-life experience that connects what we are learning in the classroom. My students get very little exposure to the outdoors and specifically observing wildlife in their natural habitat. This program has such a positive impact on them personally."

Does this speak to <u>your</u> heart? Or maybe you know someone who would enjoy being a naturalist? Don't delay; the training classes begin September 10th! They are on select Tuesdays and Thursdays from 9 AM to 12:30 PM from September through December.

Orange County Rarities by Samuel Bressler

May and June are traditionally the two best months for spring vagrants; the bulk of typical spring migrants have already moved north, making it easier to detect that "weird" warbler or flycatcher. This year was no different. A small number of these vagrants might overwinter in July, which brings its own mix of unusual seabirds and waterbirds.

Only one record of **Black Swift** was reported in spring, presumably a late migrant at Chiquita Ridge on June 18th, which was quite late, as was a **Calliope Hummingbird** at Irvine Regional Park, May 5th-7th.

The long-staying **American Oystercatcher** in the Dana Point Harbor area seems to have spent the summer well-north of its typical breeding range. A **Pacific Golden-Plover** was found at Bolsa Chica Ecological Reserve on May 18th, and was reported again on June 16th; this is a very rare spring migrant in the county, though not as rare as a **Pectoral Sandpiper** found at Bolsa Chica the same day.

Spring and early summer was a fruitful period for pelagic species vagrants. Orange County's first Tufted Puffin was recorded only last year; remarkably the county tallied two more individuals on May 3rd and 4th this year, both well offshore. Nearly as remarkable was the county's fourth Laysan Albatross on July 22nd. Other offshore reports included several Leach's Storm-Petrels on a July 21st pelagic trip and a Sabine's Gull seen offshore on May 4th. A lethargic **Masked Booby** found at Heisler Park on May 17th was brought in for rehabilitation on the 18th, while a Magnificent Frigatebird was seen off Crystal Cove State Beach, July 1st. Possibly up to three Franklin's **Gulls** were seen throughout the county in early May, with individuals seen offshore at Bolsa Chica Ecological Reserve and the San Juan Creek Mouth. This is a remarkably high spring count for this Prairie

Pothole-breeding species. A closely-related **Laughing Gull** was reported at Huntington State Beach on May 26th. **Common Loons** are regular in winter, but one that summered at Oak Canyon Nature Center was unseasonal (as well as being quite far inland).

For flycatchers, the only vagrant observed was a second county record for an Eastern Wood-Pewee at Huntington Central Park on June 8th-9th. This species is maddeningly-difficult to distinguish from our familiar Western Wood-Pewee; interestingly several other Southern California counties reported Eastern Wood-Pewees of their own in early June. A Loggerhead Shrike at Harbor Point Park on July 14th-15th was one of very few recent records along the coastal slope. Late spring also brought an influx of great vireo species to Orange County, with highlights including Red-eyed Vireo at Huntington Central Park, May 15th-27th, Yellow-throated Vireo, May 18th, and a Philadelphia Vireo, June 4th.

Warbler highlights included a **Bay-breasted Warbler** on May 29th and a **Hooded Warbler** on May 30th at Gilman Park and Canyon Park, respectively. Other warbler finds included a **Tennessee Warbler** and a **Black-and-White Warbler** at Huntington Central Park on May 19th and June 10th, and **Northern Parulas** at Hiltscher Park on May 13th-14th and Mason Regional Park, on June 13th. To wrap up with the cardinalids, an **Indigo Bunting** returned for its second summer to Blue Jay Campground, while **Rose-breasted Grosbeaks** were reported in unusually high numbers throughout the county.

Birds of Southern California

An Introductory Birding Skills Workshop





Sea and Sage Audubon Society is again offering a ten-week workshop on bird identification for beginning birders or those with a small amount of knowledge, which is most likely disorganized. Professional biologists whose expertise is not in ornithology or whose studies have been confined to just a few species or places, will find this workshop helpful, too. Each session will feature about 15 common birds of a particular local habitat on the coastal side of the mountains. With the use of printed worksheets and photos from the Sea and Sage Library, Sylvia Gallagher will help you to learn to identify those birds. In the process, you'll also be introduced to a variety of other topics, such as bird families, plumages and molts, bird topography, distribution and habitat preferences, behavior, vocalizations, the birding literature, birding ethics and etiquette, etc.

The topics to be covered in the series are:

- 1. Birds of neighborhoods.
- 2. Birds of playing fields and parking lots.
- 3. Birds of mudflats and shallow water.
- 4. Birds of the ocean shore.
- 5. Birds of the open country.
- 6. Birds of prey.
- 7,8. Birds of the streamside woodland (in 2 parts).
- 9. Birds of bays, lakes, and marshes.

Each person will attend ten weekly meetings via Zoom. For these, you'll need a computer and good internet access. Although sharing computers is possible, for best results, each person should have his/her own computer in a separate room. To accommodate people who do not live close by, and also meet popular demand, this workshop is presented remotely via zoom.

You will choose one of these three sections to attend:

Tues. mornings: 9:00 a.m. – ca. noon, Oct. 1 – Dec. 10 except Nov. 26 Wed. evenings: 7:00 – ca.10:00 pm, Oct. 2 – Dec. 11 except Nov. 27 Thurs. evenings: 7:00 – ca.10:00 pm, Oct. 3 – Dec. 12 except Nov. 28

Four half-day field trips to Orange County locations will be scheduled, and each time you may choose Saturday or Monday. They are on the weekends following the 3rd, 5th, 7th, and 9th workshop sessions. Participants will be divided into small groups of 7-10 people with an experienced leader. The places will be Huntington Central Park (Oct. 19, 21), Crescent Bay Point & Upper Newport Bay (Nov. 2, 4), Irvine Regional Park (Nov. 16,18), and Yorba Regional Park (Dec. 7, 9), all Orange County locations. Except for FT #2, which depends on the tides, the trips will run from 8:00 AM till around noon.

Send your reservation (see form on page 7) for this workshop, **postmarked no earlier than Sept. 3** (2-day penalty for early reservations), to "Introductory Workshop, Sylvia Gallagher, 21562 Kaneohe Ln, Huntington Beach CA 92646." Priority for placement in sections will be based on postmark date. **Enclose a LONG (4" x 9½") self-addressed stamped envelope (SASE).** If you can afford it, also please enclose a workshop donation of \$130, (check, cashier's check, or money order) made out to Sea and Sage Audubon Society. **Confirmations will be mailed Sept. 23**, including further information. The donation may be paid in 2 installments, half with your reservation and the other half by Nov. 2.

The maximum enrollment for each section is 21. If any section does not have at least 12 people enrolled by Sept. 21, it will be canceled. Reserve early though, because some sections may fill quickly.

The required book for the workshop is the **7th edition** (no other!) of the *National Geographic Field Guide to the Birds of North America* by Dunn and Alderfer. Recommended, but not required, is *Birds of Southern California* by Garrett, Dunn, and Small. These books are available in the book section of the Sea and Sage Audubon House Nature Store, open daily from 8:00 am to 4:00 pm.

Shortly after the confirmations are mailed, you will also receive, this time via email, an access code to a portion of Sea and Sage's Dropbox where you will find the workshop's introductory pictures plus the printed material in .pdf form. **YOU WILL HAVE TO PRINT OUT THE TEXTUAL MATERIAL.** Read first the document entitled "READ FIRST" for further information. *If you have questions, contact Sylvia at <u>sirgallagher@yahoo.com</u> (preferred) or 714-962-8990. <i>If you phone and get no answer, don't leave a message; write an email instead.*

Remembering Dick Cabe

Dick passed away in July, but we will always remember him for his birding enthusiasm and his patient demeanor. He and his wife, Pat, were both avid birders and active in the birding community for many years. Dick started casually birding in 1976 after seeing his "spark bird" - a Scott's Oriole - on a camping trip in Joshua Tree National Park. He didn't really get hooked on birding until he started taking Sylvia Gallagher's workshops. Eventually, he started keeping track by photographing his life birds as well, amassing well over 700 photographed species from Alaska to Florida as he and Pat traveled around the country.

In college, Dick earned a degree in accounting and then got his CPA license. He joined the family business of Cabe Brothers Toyota in Long Beach and later ventured into self-employment as a registered Piano Technician. Retirement was filled with birding adventures and travel to Russia, Alaska, Costa Rice, Canada, and the US.

He enjoyed a wide range of hobbies: fishing aboard his power boats, playing tennis, skiing, birding, gardening, music and reading. He and Pat led many birding field trips for Sea & Sage including Huntington Central Park and William Heise County Park near Julian. Pat was excellent at spotting birds and Dick was very patient when helping trip participants find those birds which were hidden in the vegetation.

2024 Bloom-Hays Ecological Research Grant and Zembal Wetland Research Grant:

Six excellent student proposals were selected for funding by the Sea and Sage Student Grants
Committee. The objective of the Bloom-Hays Ecological Research Grant is to advance ecological research, particularly research related to avian species and the natural communities upon which they depend, by providing funds or supplies to support research activities benefitting native species and habitats in Southern California. The objective of the Zembal Wetland Research Grant is to advance ecological research related to coastal wetland habitats of Southern California, including habitats that support shorebirds and seabirds.

Bloom-Hays Ecological Research Grant

Ella Eleopoulus - California State Polytechnic University, Pomona (MS), \$2,500. *Prevalence of Anticoagulant Rodenticides in Raptors*

Carolyn Coyle - Colorado State University (PhD), \$2,500. Songbirds as Pollinators: Uncovering Plants of Importance for Southern California's Flower-Foraging Songbirds

Zembal Wetland Research Grant

None of the applications submitted in 2024 were related to coastal wetland habitats, shorebirds, or seabirds. Therefore, no Zembal Wetland Research Grants were awarded in 2024. Funding for 2024 will be carried over to provide research grants in future years.

From the San Diego Fwv (405): Exit on Jamboree, south toward Newport Beach. At the 1st signal, Michelson. turn left. Continue on Michelson (past the old entrance to the SJWS) to the 5th signal which is Harvard and turn right. Drive to University & turn right. Drive to Campus Drive & turn right. Stay in the far right lane and immediately turn right onto Riparian View which will enter the San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary. The entrance road is marked by a large sign. If you miss the turn and reach Carlson, turn right and go around the block again to Harvard. The sanctuary is open every day from dawn until dusk.
