## " Travails of a Jetty Black Oystercatcher Chick" presented by Joel Weintraub

Against all odds, Orange County, California produced at least three juvenile Black Oystercatchers from the 2024 season. The Black Oystercatcher is designated as Climate Endangered. This talk follows the journey of one of them from near hatchling to juvenile status on the Dana Point breakwater. We will cover the history of the Dana Point jetty, the status of Black Oystercatchers, and the stresses and mortality factors on raising their young in our county. The talk will rely on videos and photos, mainly taken by the author and Dawn Garcia.

Joel Weintraub, born and raised in New York City, is an emeritus Professor of Zoology at California State University Fullerton. He was instrumental in establishing the Environmental Studies Master's Degree program there, and in 1995 was recognized by the Orange County Science Education Association with their Award for Excellence in Science Education. Joel and Bob Allen created the first Orange County Birding listserv in 2000 which they maintained for 16 years. Joel also ran the Orange County Rare Bird Alert for many years.

Joel maintains a YouTube channel at 'JDW Talks' with over a hundred videos on Orange County birds, birding optics, and Family History topics in naturalization, immigration, and the U.S. and NY censuses.

Join conservationist, author, and ecologist, Carl Safina, founder of the Safina Center, as he presents his program. After rescuing, raising, and releasing an orphaned Screech Owl, author Carl Safina expected their friendship to end there. However, shortly after her release, Alfie the owl chose to maintain her close connection with Carl and his wife Patricia and returned to their yard to begin living in the nest box above Carl's studio. Having forged a close bond of trust, Alfie had lived in Carl and Patricia's world and was now bringing them into hers.

Among his many achievements, Carl is an inaugural holder of the Endowed Chair for Nature and Humanity at Stony Brook University, a Pew Fellow in Marine conservation, and a recipient of Chicago's Brookfield Zoo's Rabb Medal. He was named among the "100 Notable Conservationists of the 20th Century" by *Audubon magazine*.

The evening's program will also include a Silent Auction and the presentation of our chapter's Fern Zimmerman Conservation Award and Letters of Commendation. # **Orange County Rarities** by Samuel Bressler

Due to the long list of exciting rare birds found in the county this year, I have no space to write a meaningful intro. May 2025 be just as birdy! Note that individuals marked with an (\*) were first discovered on Christmas Bird Counts.

A very cooperative **King Eider**, only the fifth ever count record was found at Seabridge Park in Huntington Beach from December 23-31; it was joined by a **Long-tailed Duck** on the 25th. A **White-winged Scoter** was off Newport Pier November 29-December 1, while an **Ancient Murrelet** was seen off Dana Point November 22, while a **Red-necked Grebe** first found off Huntington Beach Pier November 22 continued through the end of the year. November and December were not months for pelagic species, with the only notable vagrant being a **Masked booby which** was seen offshore November 11, while onshore the invasion of **Neotropic Cormorants** continues both coastally and inland, with a high count of 7 recorded at Anaheim Lake December 29th.

At least one **Zone-tailed Hawk** was seen soaring over various towns in South County throughout November and December, as this species is wont to do. More interesting was a **Short-eared Owl\*** found at Santiago Canyon landfill December 15th. It's been a good winter thus far for **Yellow-bellied Sapsuckers**, with individuals reported from Olinda Ranch Park November 17-24, Solana Park\* December 15, and Hiltscher Park December 19th. It's been a tremendously good winter for flycatchers, the most notable of which was an **Olive-sided Flycatcher\*** (Orange County's fourth winter record) along Panorama trail in Fullerton December 28-9. A continuing **Eastern Phoebe** at Quail Hill Preserve through December 21, and a new one at the Anaheim YMCA December 15 through the end of the year. Similarly, a **Tropical Kingbird** continued at Huntington Central Park through the end of the year, while a second bird was at Carr Park December 23-26. At least four empid species are known to be overwintering in the county at this time, with the most notable being a **Dusky Flycatcher** first found at Veeh Ranch Park December 14.

A **Gray Catbird** first seen at Doheny State Beach November 7 continued through the end of the year, and was the first since 2020. A **Mountain Bluebird** was at Quail Hill Preserve November 19-21, while a **Varied Thrush** first seen at Irvine Regional Park November 11 was last observed December 8. A **Lapland Longspur** was at Linda Vista Park in Mission Viejo November 2. **Swamp Sparrows** were at Bolsa Chica Ecological Reserve December 24 and Arevalos Park along the Santa Ana River December 29-31.

All three vagrant oriole species were found in the county this winter, including a **Scott's Oriole** near O'Neill Regional Park December 17, a continuing **Orchard Oriole** in Fountain Valley last seen December 6. A **Baltimore Oriole** continued at Pepperwood Park in Irvine through December 27, and a new pair at Emery Park in Fullerton December 11. A **Tricolored Blackbird** was at Carr Park December 16-29.

Several excellent eastern warblers made a short or long-term stop in the county this winter; this report will focus on the highlights. The returning **Chestnut-sided Warbler** continued at Irvine North Lake through the end of the year, while a **Black-throated Blue Warbler** at Oak Canyon Nature Center November 12 and a **Pine Warbler** at Lake Forest Veterans Park December 13 were apparently both one-day wonders. A **Black-throated Green Warbler** at Gabrielino Park in Irvine December 29 continued through the end of the year, as did a **Bay-breasted Warbler** found December 24 at Seabridge Park. A **MacGillivray's Warbler** at Edison Park in Seal Beach was one of very few winter records. At least four **Rose-breasted Grosbeaks** were found in the county throughout the winter, while a **Black-headed Grosbeak\*** was at Santiago Oaks Regional Park December 28th.

# Northeastern (Inland) CBC Report – 12/15/24

**The Northeastern CBC covers the inland areas of Orange County and was divided into the following sections:** Irvine Reg. Park; Irvine Lake & vicinity; Silverado Canyon; Upper & Lower Black Star Canyon; <u>Mountain Areas</u> – closed due to fire damage; Modjeska & Harding Canyons; O'Neill Reg. Park & Plano Trabuco; Lion Country & Areas south of the 405 (The area between Lake Forest & El Toro from Trabuco Rd. to Glen Ranch Rd, excluding Oso Reservoir); Mission Viejo-Lake Forest-El Toro & foothills; former El Toro Marine Base & foothill areas; Rattlesnake & Siphon Reservoirs; Peters Canyon Reg. Park & Lemon Heights. The Total Species for this count was 156. The number of participants was 98.

to the San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary (5 Riparian View, Irvine) Our entrance is from Campus Dr., not Michelson

From the San Diego Fwy (405): Exit on Jamboree, south toward Newport Beach. At the 1st signal. Michelson. turn left. Continue on Michelson (past the old entrance to the SJWS) to the 5th signal which is Harvard and turn right. Drive to University & turn right. Drive to Campus Drive & turn right. Stay in the far right lane and immediately turn right onto Riparian View which will enter the San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary. The entrance road is marked by a large sign. If you miss the turn and reach Carlson, turn right and go around the block again to Harvard. The sanctuary is open every day from dawn until dusk.


