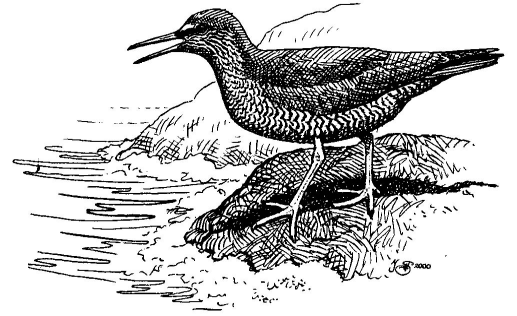

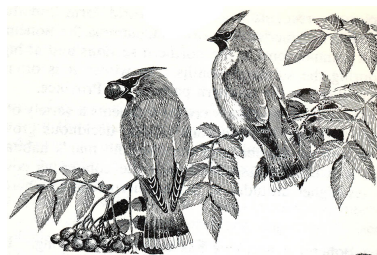

Each year since 1967 the Conservation Committee has presented the Conservation Award and Letters of Commendation to individuals or organizations that have made noteworthy contributions to the protection of habitats, natural resources, birds or wildlife in Orange County. This year at the Annual Dinner on Friday, March 21, it will be our honor to present the following:

Fern Zimmerman Conservation Award

◆ **Lena Hayashi:** for your dedication to protecting open spaces and birds in Huntington Beach, Costa Mesa and Newport Beach. You helped grow and preserve the Magnolia and Newland Marshes and the Wetlands and Wildlife Care Center. You were instrumental in the establishment of the Orange Coast River Park and the Save Banning Ranch movement. You organized and led many bird surveys and Christmas Counts and encouraged countless others to appreciate and protect open spaces. Thank you for using your many talents and skills to protect the environment and natural resources.

Letter of Commendation

◆ **Mike Evans & Jeff Bohn, Tree of Life Nursery:** for the wonderful impact you have made in bringing native plants to the home garden, creating a genre of sustainable and habitat-friendly landscaping, and educating Southern Californians on the importance of native plants. Thank you for your vision to "provide inspiration, information, and all the goods necessary, especially high-quality native plants, so people can experience nature's healing salve in their California gardens." So many of us - including birds and other wildlife - have benefited because of it.



Who is Fern Zimmerman?

Fern Zimmerman was a true conservationist, grass roots organizer, birdwatcher, and chapter leader who contributed much to the development of Sea and Sage Audubon Society. Fern provided a constant source of optimism about our ability to effect change in our environment and helped us find our voice in advocacy. Fern received the SAS Conservation Award in 1973. She continued as a conservation activist for 23 more years. After her death in 1996, Sea and Sage named its conservation award in her honor.

Having forged a close bond of trust, Alfie had lived in Carl and Patricia's world and was now bringing them into hers.

Among his many achievements, Carl is an inaugural holder of the Endowed Chair for Nature and Humanity at Stony Brook University, a Pew Fellow in Marine conservation, and a recipient of Chicago's Brookfield Zoo's Rabb Medal. He was named among the "100 Notable Conservationists of the 20th Century" by *Audubon magazine*.

The evening's program will also include a Silent Auction and the presentation of our chapter's Fern Zimmerman Conservation Award and Letters of Commendation. Avian Influenza update

Humans remain at low risk for avian influenza (bird flu) but the virus is spreading among poultry and wild birds. You can develop good hygiene for your backyard bird feeders and baths now. Cleaning your feeders regularly helps prevent the spread of illnesses such as salmonella, fungal and eye infections, and avian pox plus bird flu. For BIRD FEEDER cleaning, take apart the feeder if possible and scrub every 1- 2 weeks with hot water and mild dishwashing liquid, soak in bleach solution (1 part bleach to 10 parts water) for 10 minutes, and then thoroughly rinse and allow to dry. Rake up the old seed and hulls below the feeder and dispose of the seeds. BIRD BATHS should be rinsed, scrubbed with vinegar solution (1 part vinegar to 10 parts water), and rinsed again. Change the water every other day. ALWAYS WEAR DISPOSABLE GLOVES.

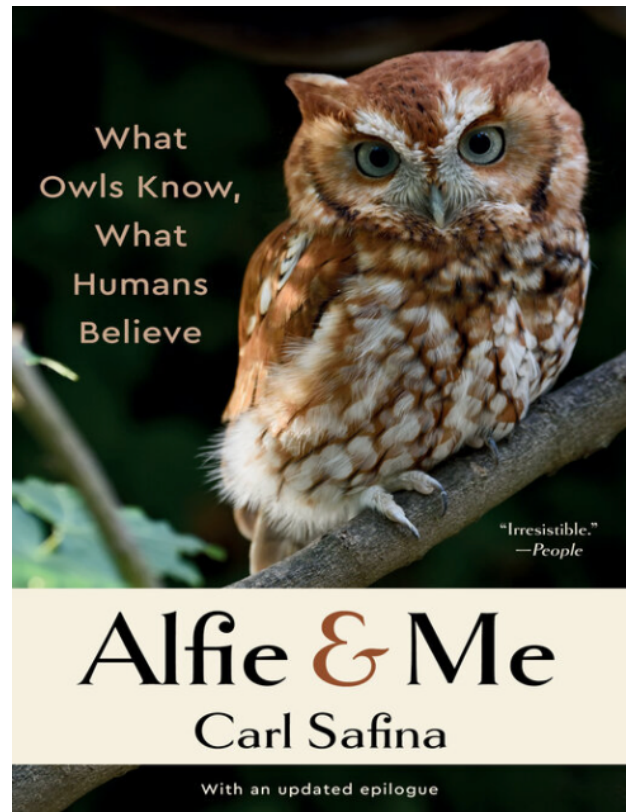

His book, "Eye of the Albatross: Visions of Hope and Survival," chronicles the life and long-distance travels of an albatross. His most recent book is "Alfie & Me: What Owls Know, What Humans Believe."

Orange County Rarities

Orange County birders did an excellent job finding rarities in December, as relatively few new ones turned up in January. Well done all! The most interesting phenomenon in January was an incursion of Sage Thrashers into the county. Birders are encouraged to keep an eye out for this species in sparse scrub or grassland.

The continuing **Long-tailed Duck** at Seabridge Park was last seen on January 8th. A **Pacific Golden-Plover** was at Upper Newport Bay on January 11th, while an **American Oystercatcher** continued along the south county coast through at least the 28th. The **Red-necked Grebe** at Huntington Beach Pier continued through the end of the month. **Neotropic Cormorants** were seen at numerous locations throughout the county, with a high count of 8 at the Miller Retarding Basin, January 1st.

At least two **Zone-tailed Hawks** appear to be wintering in the county with one in the Lake Forest area last seen January 24th, and one in the Irvine area last seen January 22nd. A **Prairie Falcon** was seen flying over Irvine Lake January 25th. **Little Blue Herons** continued at Bolsa Chica Ecological Reserve and the lower Santa Ana River through January 7th and January 26th, respectively.

A **Yellow-bellied Sapsucker** continued at Hiltcher Park through January 10th, while an additional individual was found at Mile Square Regional Park January 31st. The **Olive-sided Flycatcher** along the Panorama Nature Trail in Fullerton was last seen on January 3rd. Continuing empids included a **Hammond's Flycatcher** through at least January 23rd, **Gray Flycatchers** at Irvine Lake and Riverdale Park last seen on January 25th and 28th, respectively, and a **Dusky Flycatcher** at Veeh Ranch Park, last seen January 25th. The **Eastern Phoebe** at the West Anaheim YMCA continued through the end of the month, while **Tropical Kingbirds** were last seen January 7th at John Baca Park and January 31st at Huntington Central Park. **Plumbeous Vireos** were found at Hiltcher Park January 10th and at Oso Creek Trail January 28th, while a **Cassin's Vireo** was at Riverdale Park from January 5th-21st. A **Brown Creeper** continued at Huntington Central Park through the end of the month.

Sage Thrashers were found in remarkable numbers in January, with at least 10 reported throughout the county. This is part of a regional invasion throughout southern California, of unknown cause. The **Gray Catbird** at Doheny State Beach continued through January 29th, while a **Varied Thrush** continued through the 16th. A **Townsend's Solitaire** was at Knollcrest Park on January 28th-31st.

White-throated Sparrows were at O'Neill Regional Park on January 7th, residential Tustin on January 5th, Green Park in Huntington Beach on January 11th, and Westminster Memorial Park on January 18th-31st. **Vesper Sparrows** were found in several locations in eastern Orange County throughout the month, while a more coastal individual continued at Quail Hill Preserve through the end of the month. A **Swamp Sparrow** continued at Arevalos Park through January 4th, while a second bird was found at San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary January 17th-29th. At least 3 **Green-tailed Towhees** continued at Overlook Park through January 29th, while another individual was seen at Talbert Nature Preserve on January 7th.

The continuing **Orchard Oriole** in Fountain Valley was last seen on January 25th. A **Baltimore Oriole** at Emery Park was also last seen on the 25th, while one at Pepperwood Park continued through the 26th. The **Tricolored Blackbird** at Carr Park was last seen on January 18th.

January's standout rarity was undoubtedly a **Grace's Warbler** at Knollcrest Park on January 16th. The bird continued through at least the 26th; this appears to be the fourth Orange County record. Other rare warblers included a continuing **Black-throated Green Warbler** at Gabrielino Park through January 20th, **Bay-breasted Warbler** at Seabridge park through the 28th, and **Chestnut-sided Warbler** at North Lake through the 18th. An **American Redstart** at Huntington Central Park continued through the end of the month, and **Black-and-White Warblers** were found in at least three locations. A **Black-headed Grosbeak** was at Vista Bonita Park on January 2nd-4th.

San Juan Capistrano CBC Report - 12/21/24

The San Juan Capistrano CBC covers the southern section of Orange County and is divided into the following areas: Laguna Niguel Regional Park & vicinity; San Clemente; Caspers Wilderness Park; Pelagic Areas along the coast, or a Sea Watch from land; Saddleback College & vicinity; Upper San Juan Creek & vicinity; Aliso-Woods Canyon; Dana Point: Doheny State Beach, Dana Point Harbor, Dana Point Headlands, Salt Creek Beach, local parks, golf course; Thomas F. Riley Wilderness Park, Sienna Botanica Trail, Arroyo Trabuco Wilderness, Jeronimo Open Space Park, Esencia Sports Park & Orchard Loop Trail. The count was organized and compiled by Darrell Wilson.

The Total Species for this count was 133. The number of participants 67.

If you miss the turn and reach Carlson, turn right and go around the block again to Harvard. The sanctuary is open every day from dawn until dusk.
