As the new president of Sea and Sage Audubon, I am honored to have this opportunity to lead this organization. Thank you for your trust and support. I look forward to working alongside the board, staff, volunteers, and all our members to advance our mission: to protect birds, other wildlife, and their habitats through education, citizen science, research, and public policy advocacy.

After working 25 years as an internal medicine physician, the first place I thought about volunteering after I retired was Sea and Sage Audubon. I wanted to give back to Sea and Sage and to support conservation work. My child spent more than 10 years participating in Sea and Sage's Marsh Education programs, and her experiences had a profound impact shaping her career. Through speaking engagements as a UC Master Gardener, Orange County and for Sea and Sage Audubon, I educate and promote sustainable landscaping and the preservation of habitats.

In these turbulent times, I believe that we must stay true to our mission. One of the best-ways to accomplish this is to strengthen our alliances, increase our outreach, educate the next generation, and actively advocate. At our recent Earth Day event, Congressman Dave Min spoke with a group of us. His message was that we must unite for our common purposes and actively advocate. We can easily do this because we <u>care</u> about birds! We will be continuing to work on outreach to the community and expanding advocacy. If each of us gets involved and we unite as a collective, we can ensure that species and habitats are there for the generations to come. I encourage everyone to actively participate in whatever way you choose. As our community grows, our voice will be louder and stronger!

" Healing Through Birding" presented by Tiffany Kersten



Tiffany Kersten did not set out to do a Big Year, but after a series of unanticipated and serendipitous events, she found herself amidst one. As a sexual assault survivor, she spent 2021 traveling to all corners of the Lower 48 States tallying birds and gifting personal safety alarm to women she met along the way. Her goal was to see 700 species, and to raise awareness of women's safety in the outdoors. She ended up surpassing her goal and setting a record of 726 species. In her presentation, Tiffany will lead us through the fear, empowerment, struggles that all play vital roles in her personal growth she experienced on this wild adventure.

Tiffany Kersten is a Wisconsin native. She holds a B.S. in Wildlife Ecology from Northland College and has spent over a decade as an environmental educator, teaching about bird migration with the Cape May Bird Observatory, monitoring shorebirds on Cape Cod, banding Honeycreepers in Hawaii, and finally landing in South Texas where she worked for the Santa Ana National Wildlife Refuge and then managed the McAllen Nature Center. After completing her Lower 48 States Big Year in 2021, she founded her own company, Nature Ninja Birding tours. She guides primarily in the Rio Grande Valley of South Texas and offers international tours as well.

CELEBRATING SPRING MIGRATION!

We hope you enjoyed spring, and the migration phenomenon along the Pacific Flyway by birding, and perhaps by contributing to Sea & Sage's annual **OC Spring Count**. See our website for information on how to participate.

This year, **Sea & Sage's April 27 Earth Day** event brought attention to migrating birds - and people - by focusing on the "calls to action" of **World Migratory Bird Day (WMBD) 2025** to: * Reduce bird collisions by making glass visible and dimming lights at night

- * Protect insects and pollinators
- * Reduce pesticide use
- * Plant native plants
- * Keep birds safe from pets
- * Reduce plastic pollution

* Advocate for sustainable urban planning and bird-friendly spaces.

The **Earth Day event**, organized by chapter leaders and the Events Committee, included bird walks and talks, an IRWD display on water conservation, and five exhibit tables created by Conservation and the Marsh Education Project about the actions advised by WMBD 2025 to create bird-friendly urban places and Sea & Sage volunteer opportunities. The event was successful on several levels. **Thank you all!**

Room, as visitors stopped by the displays and talked about individual action and volunteer opportunities. It was inspiring to be amid such enthusiastic interest and commitment.

Welcome to our New Naturalists

In 2024-5, five volunteers completed Outdoor Adventures Naturalist training and one will finish this upcoming fall. Their backgrounds are as varied as the birds we encounter at the marsh: retired pharmacist, professor at UCI, tutor for 4-5th grade Tustin children, Nature Day Camp volunteer, Sea and Sage Board member, and one of Sylvia Gallagher's students. Each one is unique and shares a love of nature.

During Project Director Trude Hurd's four training classes, the six recruits learned how to ask engaging questions, how to teach children to effectively use binoculars and microscopes, and how to identify common birds and macro-invertebrates encountered during the tours. They showed curiosity and patience while working with experienced naturalists to observe and practice during actual Outdoor Adventures programs in winter and spring. Orange County Rarities by Samuel Bressler

April proved exceptionally quiet for both expected and unexpected migrants, perhaps due to colder temperatures persisting later into the year than usual. Whether this means that there will be a peak of migratory activity in May, or if the end of the migratory season is pushed further back into June, remains to be seen.

Two **White-winged Scoters** continued off Newport Beach April through the 17th. **Calliope Hummingbirds** were found at Irvine Regional Park on April 30th. **Neotropic Cormorants** continue to establish across the county; individuals were reported in April from San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary, the Upper Santa Ana River, Carbon Canyon Regional Park, Mile Square Regional Park, and Tri-City Park. The first breeding record for the county seems a matter of when, not if. The wintering **Little Blue Heron** along the lower Santa Ana River was last seen April 12th.

The **Tropical Kingbird** at Huntington Central Park was last seen April 11th, while an **Eastern Phoebe** at Sea Terrace Park in Dana Point proved to be a one-day wonder. **Plumbeous Vireos** were at North Lake on April 9th-13th, Pepperwood Park on April 11th, and Veeh Ranch Park on April 15th.

Notable sightings during April also included a pair of Black Skimmers frequenting Bolsa Chica Ecological Reserve from the 10th to the 20th, a species that continues to generate excitement among local birders. Additionally, a rare Swainson's Hawk was spotted soaring over Santiago Canyon on April 22nd, marking a highlight of the month for raptor enthusiasts. Northbound shorebirds were also seen in modest numbers, with a Pectoral Sandpiper documented at Upper Newport Bay on April 19th.

Four April records of **Purple Martin** (at Anaheim Coves Park, Huntington Central Park, Upper Newport Bay, and Laguna Niguel Regional Park) was a good count for this scarce spring migrant. By contrast, the only **Bank Swallow** in fall was an individual at San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary, April 25th through the end of the month. A **White Wagtail** along the Upper Santa Ana River on April 25th was not subsequently refound.

White-throated Sparrows were at Black Star canyon April 8th and O'Neill Regional Park, April 16th, while the wintering Green-tailed Towhee at Overlook Park was last seen April 11th. A flyover Yellow-headed Blackbird was at Huntington Central Park April 27th.

Several overwintering vagrant warblers continued into April, included continuing **Black-and-white Warbler** and **American Redstart** at Huntington Central Park, last seen April 24th and 26th, respectively; the continuing **Lucy's Warbler** at Sea Terrace Community Park (last seen April 6th). Presumed migrants included **Northern Waterthrushes** at Bartlett Park April 17th-25th, and Harriett Wieder Regional Park April 29th, and a **Palm Warbler** at Veeh Ranch Park April 13th-18th. A second Palm Warbler at Del Obispo Park April 25th-30th may have overwintered locally. A **Rose-breasted Grosbeak** was at Santiago Oaks Regional Park April 8th, while an **Indigo Bunting** was at Hiltscher Park April 30th.

Stay in the far right lane and immediately turn right onto Riparian View which will enter the San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary. The entrance road is marked by a large sign. 
