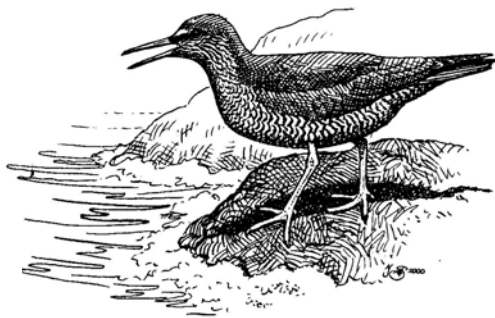

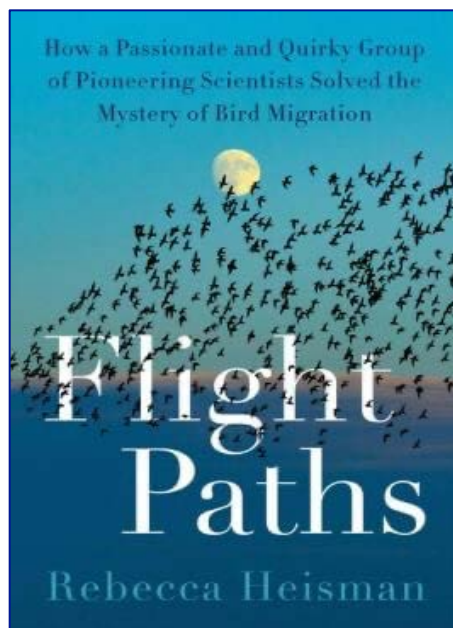

2026 FERN ZIMMERMAN CONSERVATION AWARD and LETTER OF COMMENDATION

Each year since 1967 the Conservation Committee has presented the Conservation Award and Letters of Commendation to individuals or organizations that have made noteworthy contributions to the protection of habitats, natural resources, birds or wildlife in Orange County.

As the 50th Anniversary of the California Coastal Act approaches, it is fitting and an honor for Sea and Sage Audubon to recognize two excellent coastal champions of California's coastal resources and its wildlife. This year at the Sea and Sage Annual Dinner on Friday, March 20, it is our pleasure to present the following:

Fern Zimmerman Conservation Award

◆ **Mel Nutter** a retired attorney from Long Beach, for his lifetime commitment to the protection of California's coastal resources. His work has been essentially volunteer, first as one of the chairs with the original Coastal Commission, shortly after passage of the California Coastal Act in the 1970's, and more recently with the Amigos de Bolsa Chica, from successful pro bono representation of the Amigos in the 1990's to serving as their President for the last three years.

Letter of Commendation

◆ **Dr. Rebecca Duerr** for devoting her remarkable surgical skills and her extraordinary commitment to the rehabilitation and conservation of birds, especially the California Brown Pelican; her work to advance our understanding of the many factors contributing to the California Brown Pelican's decline; and her strong voice for their welfare and survival.

◆ Who is Fern Zimmerman?

Fern Zimmerman was a true conservationist, grass roots organizer, birdwatcher, and chapter leader who contributed much to the development of Sea and Sage Audubon Society. Fern provided a constant source of optimism about our ability to effect change in our environment and helped us find our voice in advocacy. Fern received the SAS Conservation Award in 1973. She continued as a conservation activist for 23 more years. After her death in 1996, Sea and Sage named its conservation award in her honor.

Program - "Wild Stories from the History of Bird Migration Research"

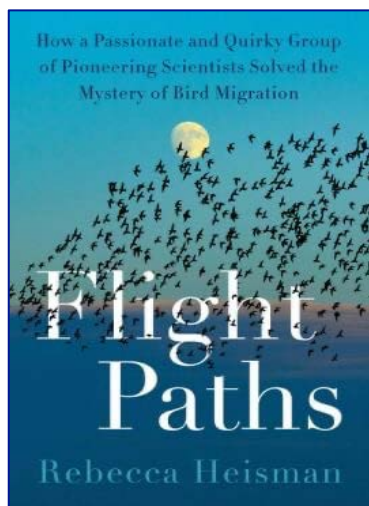
Have you ever wondered about "how we know what we know about bird migration?" Join us at the Sea & Sage Annual Dinner to learn more from our special guest speaker, Rebecca Heisman. Heisman is an award-winning science writer who focuses on ornithology. Her first book *Flight Paths: How a Passionate and Quirky Group of Pioneering Scientists Solved the Mystery of Bird Migration* was published in 2023. Rebecca has worked with organizations including the Audubon Society, American Bird Conservancy, Cornell Lab of Ornithology, and American Ornithological Society. She has also contributed to multiple publications including *Audubon* and *Hakai* magazines.



Rebecca will chronicle the history of migratory bird research and share the amazing advances in bird banding, tracking birds, and genetic research.

The evening's program will also include the presentation of our chapter's Fern Zimmerman Conservation Award and Letters of Commendation. Of note, there will be **NO SILENT AUCTION** this year.

Seal Beach FT Rescheduled

Our Accessible Birding FT at the Seal Beach NWR has been rescheduled from March 28 to Sat, March 21st. Check-in time is 8:30 am.

This field trip is a special opportunity to visit the Seal Beach NWR on a private tour. This is a wetlands area which serves as a stopover for birds migrating along the Pacific Flyway. Visitors must be US citizens and have their Driver's License or Passport with them. Group size is limited; confirmation must be completed by March 6. The reserve will allow those who need to always have their cars to drive into the reserve. All others will take a shuttle bus into the reserve from the parking lot. There will be approximately 1 mile of walking during the 3-hour tour. A shuttle is also available for those who need to limit their walking. Besides viewing the birds, we will also learn about the native turtles, see a film about the refuge and hear about projects within the refuge itself.

You will need to bring a lunch for a picnic lunch following the tour. Priority registration will be given to accessible birders, and a wait list will be kept in the order of registration. If you have already registered, please send me a new email srockwell@writeme.com indicating that you will attend on March 21st. I will return a new confirmation email with directions to our meeting location.

Orange County Rarities

The new year often brings newfound experiences, traditions, and ideas to many. But for birders, it couldn't be more different. January is characterized by known wintering rarities and the quest to find previously undetected ones. Spring is still a couple months away, the same amount of time before birders experience a true shift in their local sightings. Until then, we keep forward, enjoying the new year and winter season while it lasts!

An **American Oystercatcher** continued along the Southern coastline this month. **Laughing Gulls** were seen at Newport Pier and Bolsa Chica early in the month. A **Stilt Sandpiper** continued on the backside of Bolsa Chica Ecological Reserve on January 28. **Neotropic Cormorants** continue to become more prevalent, with upwards of 10 birds in the county this month. At least 2 **Little Blue Herons** continued at Bolsa Chica, as did a **Tricolored Heron** and **Western Cattle-Egret**. A **Zone-tailed Hawk** continued in Rancho Santa Margarita, while another was seen at Irvine Lake.

Three **Yellow-bellied Sapsuckers** were throughout the county this month, two birds being newly discovered. An **Eastern Phoebe** continued at Harriet Weider Regional Park, while a **Tropical Kingbird** continued at Bolsa Chica all month. Additional flycatchers included two **Hammond's Flycatchers**, with one in Fullerton and one at Huntington Central Park, as well as 3 **Western Flycatchers** spending the winter. Continuing a good winter for **Plumbeous Vireos**, 6 individuals were throughout the county this month. Additionally, rarer in winter, two **Cassin's Vireos** were seen this month, in Cypress and Irvine respectively.

The only **Green-tailed Towhee** this month was on the Borrego Trail in Lake Forest from the 12th-15th. A **Clay-colored Sparrow** continued in residential Buena Park on January 6. Three **White-throated Sparrows** were present, two of them being in the UCI area of Irvine. At least 5 **Vesper Sparrows** were found this month, and a great total of 5 **Grasshopper Sparrows** were at Quail Hill preserve in Irvine.

Two adult male **Baltimore Orioles** continued this month, with one at Pepperwood Park in Irvine and another at Harper Park in Huntington Beach. Two **Black-and-White Warblers** were present this month, as well as a great total of 6 **American Redstarts**. **Northern Parulas** were at Huntington Central Park and Manzanita Park in Cypress. A **Pine Warbler** continued from November at Good Shepherd Catholic Cemetery in Huntington Beach this month.

Additional wintering warblers included a **Hermit Warbler** at San Mateo Park in Irvine on January 17, and the wintering male **MacGillivray's Warbler** at Edison Park in Seal Beach early in the year. The standout bird of the month was a very rare **Grace's Warbler** wintering at Memory Garden Memorial Park in Brea. A solid total of 5 **Tennessee Warblers** were scattered across OC this month, while two **Chestnut-sided Warblers** were in the county's northwestern region. A **Rose-breasted Grosbeak** was at Riverdale Park in Anaheim on January 4, while the much rarer in winter **Black-headed Grosbeak** was in residential Laguna Beach late in the month.

San Juan Capistrano CBC Report - 12/21/25

The San Juan Capistrano CBC covers the southern section of Orange County and is divided into the following areas: Laguna Niguel Regional Park & vicinity; San Clemente; Caspers Wilderness Park; Pelagic Areas along the coast, or a Sea Watch from land; Saddleback College & vicinity; Upper San Juan Creek & vicinity; Aliso-Woods Canyon; Dana Point: Doheny State Beach, Dana Point Harbor, Dana Point Headlands, Salt Creek Beach, local parks, golf course; Thomas F. Riley Wilderness Park, Sienna Botanica Trail, Arroyo Trabuco Wilderness, Jeronimo Open Space Park, Esencia Sports Park & Orchard Loop Trail. The count was organized and compiled by Darrell Wilson.

Stay in the far right lane and take the 1st right turn onto Riparian View which will enter the San Joaquin Wildlife Sanctuary. The entrance road is marked by a large sign. If you miss the turn and reach Carlson, turn right and go around the block again to Harvard. The sanctuary is open every day from dawn until dusk.

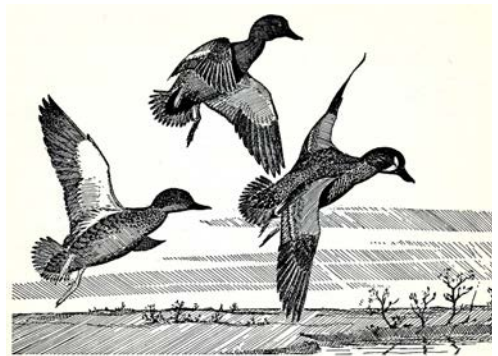
